- 1. The Term of this MOU begins on the date executed and will remain in effect for the life of the vehicle or until it is returned to the County.
- 2. The ownership and title the vehicle shall remain with the County.
- 3. CPVFD will hold and utilize the vehicle for its useful life or until such time it is returned to the County.
- 4. CPVFD will be responsible for all expenses concerning the vehicle, including but not limited to the inspection, registration, operation, maintenance, and insurance coverage.
- 5. CPVFD shall report immediately to the County if the vehicle is lost, stolen, damaged, or removed from service to the public and CPVFD shall provide satisfactory remedies relating to the said loss.
- 6. CPVFD may not assign, loan, or sell the vehicle to any other party without the express written consent of the County.
- 7. This agreement may be terminated by either party after 60 days written notice.

The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) recently issued a new contract to SylogistGov, Inc. to provide victim notification software for Texas' Statewide Automated Victim Notification Service (SAVNS) program. This replaces the previous software used by your county, Texas VINE, operated by Appriss Insights, LLC. The transition to the new vendor will be completed by August 31, 2025.

As we begin this important transition, the OAG asks for your partnership on several key steps ahead. A critical next action is executing the **enclosed Service Agreement** between your entity and SylogistGov, Inc. # PARTICIPATING ENTITIES SERVICES AGREEMENT FOR THE STATEWIDE AUTOMATED VICTIM NOTIFICATION SERVICE (SAVNS)

The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) is the Texas State agency tasked with providing a Statewide Automated Victim Notification Service (SAVNS) to a variety of political subdivisions of the State of Texas, including counties, county Sheriffs, Community Supervision Departments, courts, clerks, district attorneys, county attorneys, and others that are participating in the SAVNS ("Participating Entities"). The OAG conducted a competitive solicitation and contracted with SylogistGov, Inc. as the statewide vendor to provide SAVNS to each of the Participating Entities.

This Agreement is entered into by and between the \_\_\_\_\_ ("Named Entity"), and <u>SylogistGov, Inc.</u> ("Contractor"), (collectively, "the Parties").

#### 1. Purpose of the Agreement.

This Participating Entities Services Agreement ("Agreement") is issued in order for Contractor to provide all of the SAVNS services to ("Named Entity") as described in the Contract Documents referenced in Section 5 of this Agreement which are fully incorporated herein by reference.

#### 2. Contract Term.

This Agreement shall be effective upon execution and the subscription term for the SAVNS solution shall begin on May 1, 2025 when modification and access to the Integrated Victim Services System (IVSS) is initiated. The agreement shall end on August 31, 2026. The Agreement may be renewed for two (2) optional, two (2) year renewal terms, only to the extent the OAG Contract No. C-02213 for SAVNS remains in effect and is renewed. Any such renewals shall be subject to the requirements of this Agreement and all of the Contract Documents referenced in Section 5 of this Agreement. For clarity, all of the terms regarding Termination shall apply to this Agreement as set out in the OAG Contract No. C-02213 for SAVNS referenced in Section 5 of this Agreement and incorporated herein, and the Named Entity/Participating Entity has all of the same requirements, rights, and remedies as the OAG as set out in the Termination sections of that Contract.

#### 3. Compensation and Invoicing.

The Parties stipulate and agree that the total amount to be paid to Contractor in consideration of full and satisfactory performance of all Contractor's duties, services, and obligations as set forth in this Agreement shall be billed on a recurring bi-annual basis, in accordance with Form B – SAVNS Pricing, and not to exceed the bi-annual fee per calendar year, in accordance with the Contract Documents referenced in Section 5 of this Agreement which are incorporated herein.

The SAVNS services shall be performed for the bi-annual fee, which will be billed and invoiced in accordance with Form B – SAVNS Pricing and pursuant to the terms of this Agreement. Invoices will contain all pertinent information such as this Agreement's contract number, the dates of services rendered, and outages or performance issues, if any, all in accordance with the Contract Documents referenced in Section 5 of this Agreement.

#### 4. Appropriated Funds.

Payments are subject to the availability of appropriated funds. Whereas OAG provides grant funds to the Participating Entities as a reimbursement of the bi-annual fees due hereunder, Contractor acknowledges and agrees that payments for Participating Entity Services provided are contingent upon OAG's receipt of funds appropriated by the Texas Legislature.

#### 2.02 POLICY ON EMPLOYEE STATUS

Each county position has an employee status that identifies how the position is paid and benefits granted by Commissioners' Court. This policy defines group health insurance and other benefit eligibility. The status of a position cannot be changed without the approval of Commissioners' Court. Regular employees working an average of thirty (30) hours or more per week shall be eligible for county group health insurance (see Policy 3.01, Group Health and Life Insurance). All positions must be included in the County's initial and/or standard measurement period for the Affordable Care Act to determine health insurance eligibility. All regular full-time, part-time and variable hour employees are required to participate in the Texas County and District Retirement System (TCDRS)

#### **FULL-TIME**

1. An employee who has a normal work schedule of forty (40) hours per week shall be classified as a full-time employee. All regular full-time employees are required to participate in the County group health insurance and are required to participate in the TCDRS. Full-time, non-exempt employees are required to fill out a time sheet.

#### **PART-TIME**

2. An employee who has a normal work schedule of less than thirty (30) hours per week shall be classified as a part-time employee. All regular part-time employees working an average of 30 hours per week or more shall be eligible to participate in the County group health insurance and are required to participate in the TCDRS. Part-time employees are not eligible to accrue holiday time, vacation and sick leave, or emergency leave (see Policies 3.06, 3.07, 3.08, and 3.13). Part- time, non-exempt employees are required to fill out a time sheet.

#### **VARIABLE HOUR**

3. A variable hour employee shall be any employee for whom the County cannot determine the average amount of hours that the employee will work each week. The hours are variable or indeterminate at the time of the employee's start date. If a regular variable hour employee works an average of thirty (30) or more hours a week in the measurement period, the employee will be eligible for county group health insurance under the Affordable Care Act. If an employee's schedule becomes regular, then the employee shall be reclassified as full-time or part-time depending on the hours worked. Regular variable hour employees must also participate in the TCDRS. Variable hour employees are required to fill out a time sheet.

#### **TEMPORARY**

- 4. An employee in a position that is established for a specific period of time or until a specific project is complete shall be considered a temporary employee. Commissioners' Court must approve a temporary position (See Policy 10.01, Personnel Management Procedures).
- 5. Temporary, non-exempt employees are required to fill out a time sheet.

#### a. Temporary Seasonal:

A seasonal employee shall be any employee who is hired into a position that lasts six (6) or less months and begins at approximately the same time each year. Examples may include, but are not limited to summer mowers and election workers. The County shall define and document the season that the employee is being hired for. Seasonal employees can be either full-time or part-time. They do not qualify for county group health insurance under the Affordable Care Act and are not eligible to participate in the TCDRS.

#### b. Temporary Part Time:

A temporary short term part-time employee shall be any employee who is expected to work less than thirty (30) hours each week in a position that is estimated to last for a specific period of time or until a specific project is completed, but no longer than 12 months. #### **REGULAR**

- 7. An employee who is not considered to be a temporary employee as defined in this policy shall be considered to be a regular employee.

- 9. Employees shall be classified as exempt or nonexempt in accordance with the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) for the purposes of computing minimum wage and over-time compensation, and all other matters governed by the FLSA. A list of exempt employees approved by Commissioners' Court shall be maintained in the County Judge's Office and Human Resources.

#### **EMPLOYMENT CONTRACT**

17. No employee shall have an employment contract for a specific or indefinite period of time unless the contract is approved in writing by the Commissioners' Court.

#### **BENEFITS**

- 18. Employees and elected officials shall be eligible for benefits in accordance with the eligibility requirements stated with each policy describing a benefit.
- 19. Temporary employees shall not be eligible for any benefits except those required by law.

#### **SHIFT WORKERS**

20. Positions in a department required to be staffed seven days a week/24 hours a day. Shift workers can be full-time or part time employees.

Part-time employees are not eligible to accrue holiday time, vacation and sick leave, or emergency leave (see Policies 3.06, 3.07, 3.08, and 3.13). Part-time, non-exempt employees are required to fill out a time sheet.

#### 2.15 POLICY ON WORKPLACE HARASSMENT

Walker County is committed to a workplace free of harassment. Harassment includes unlawful, unwelcome words, acts or displays based on sex, race, color, religion, national origin, age, genetic information, pregnancy, disability, family or military leave status or veteran's status. Such conduct becomes harassment when (1) the submission to the conduct is made a condition of employment; (2) the submission to, or rejection of, the conduct is used as the basis for an employment decision; or (3) the conduct creates an offensive, intimidating or hostile working environment or interferes with work performance.

Harassment is strictly prohibited by Walker County whether committed by an elected official, appointed official, department head, co-worker or non-employee with whom the County does business.

Employees who feel they have been harassed should immediately report the situation to the elected official, appointed official or department head who is responsible for the department in which they work. If, for any reason, the employee feels that reporting the harassment to the official or department head may not be the best course of action, the report should be made to the County Judge or to the County's legal advisor.

Every reported complaint will be investigated promptly and thoroughly. While all claims of harassment shall be handled with discretion, there can be no complete assurance of full confidentiality. The official or department head to which a claim has been reported shall be responsible for seeing that prompt action is taken to investigate the claim.

Once the investigation is complete, the employee making the claim shall be notified of the result of the investigation and any actions which are to be taken.

Retaliation against an employee who reports harassment or who cooperates in the investigation is prohibited by law as well as this policy. Employees who feel they have been subjected to illegal retaliation should immediately report the situation to the elected official, appointed official, or department head who is responsible for the department in which they work. If, for any reason, the employee feels that reporting the retaliation to the official or department head may not be the best course of action, the report should be made to the County Judge or to the County's legal advisor.

Remedial action will be taken in accordance with the circumstances when the county determines unlawful harassment or retaliation has occurred, up to and including termination.

#### 2.15 POLICY ON WORKPLACE HARASSMENT



#### **EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES**

1. Walker County is committed to providing equal employment opportunity to all applicants and employees in all its employment practices and to providing a work environment free of discrimination and/or harassment on the basis of race, color, age, religion, national origin, sex, genetic information, pregnancy, disability, veteran or Vietnam era veteran status, the filing of workers' compensation claim in good faith, or any other category protected by law. This Policy applies to all aspects of employment including, but not limited to, recruitment, selection, hiring, training, promotions, transfers, discipline/counseling, pay rates, benefit plans, termination of employment, and all other forms of compensation and benefits except where required by federal and state law or where a bona fide occupational qualification exists. Walker County is also committed to compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act Amendments Act and will provide reasonable accommodation to applicants and employees when such reasonable accommodations do not impose an undue hardship on Walker County and can be provided without posing a substantial or imminent safety risk. Individuals with a disability requiring accommodations should notify their elected official or department head. Human Resources is available to provide assistance when such requests are made.

An employee who is found, after appropriate investigation, to have violated this Policy will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination.

#### POLICY PROHIBITING HARASSMENT

2. Walker County will not tolerate harassment of any employee by any elected official, appointed official, department head, supervisor, employee, co-worker, or non-employee of Walker County, on account of an employee's race, color, age, religion, national origin, sex, genetic information, pregnancy, family medical leave, disability, veteran or Vietnam era veteran status, the filing of workers' compensation claim in good faith, or any other category protected by law. For these purposes, the term harassment includes, but is not limited to slurs, offensive remarks, jokes, other verbal and/or graphic messages and/or communications, (including, but not limited to, e-mail, internet and/or any other computer generated messages or communications) or physical conduct relating to an individual's race, color, age, religion, national origin, sex, genetic information, pregnancy, disability, veteran or Vietnam era veteran status, or any category protected by law.

In furtherance of this Policy against harassment, Walker County does not condone and will not permit harassment of any employee and will not tolerate unwelcome sexual advances to any employee, remarks, slurs or jokes offensive to any employee because of his-her sex.

An employee who is found, after appropriate investigation, to have violated this Policy prohibiting harassment, will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination.

#### COMPLAINT PROCEDURES: PREVENTATIVE AND CORRECTIVE PROCEDURES

3. Walker County is committed to prevent, correct promptly, and eradicate discrimination and harassment, including, but not limited to, sexual harassment in the workplace. Any employee who believes they have been subjected to unlawful harassment or retaliation shall immediately report their complaint to their supervisor (see Policy 7.01 Grievances and Grievance Procedures). If, for any reason, including, but not limited to, the reason that the supervisor is the party that has allegedly engaged in the discriminatory and/or harassing conduct, or in the event that an employee is not comfortable or able to speak with his/her supervisor for any reason, the employee shall immediately report the act to the County Judge or Human Resources. The complaint should be filed as soon as possible after the events that resulted in the complaint. Walker County will promptly investigate all complaints for violation of this Policy in as discreet and confidential manner as possible and will take prompt remedial action.

Walker County cannot help resolve discrimination and/or harassment problem unless we know about it. Therefore, it is the employee's responsibility to bring such issues to the County's attention so that whatever steps are necessary can be taken to correct the issues and to maintain a harassment-free environment.

#### **NO RETALIATION**

4. Walker County prohibits retaliation against any employee for the use of this complaint procedure in good faith. In furtherance of this Policy, an employee who retaliates against a complaining party or witness will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination.

#### CONFIDENTIALITY

5. Information concerning a complaint of harassment will not be released to third parties or to anyone within Walker County except on a need-to-know basis or as required by law. The purpose of this provision, among other things, is to protect the confidentiality of the employee who files a complaint, to encourage the reporting of any alleged incident of discrimination and/or harassment without fear of retaliation, and to protect the reputation of any employee wrongfully charged with discrimination and/or harassment.

#### **SANCTIONS**

6. An employee who is found after appropriate investigation to have violated this Policy, prohibiting discrimination and/or harassment, will be subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination.

#### **OPEN-DOOR POLICY**

7. Walker County has an open-door policy to ensure that employee problems, concerns and/or complaints are heard. Employees are encouraged to contact their supervisor if they have a problem, concern or complaint. Employees are also encouraged to seek information, provide input, and resolve problems, concerns, and/or complaints through their supervisor. In the event that the employee's problem, concern and/or complaint concerns the supervisor, or if the employee feels that it would be inappropriate to discuss the problem, concern and/or complaint with their supervisor, then the employee may bypass their supervisor and contact the County Judge or Human Resources. Complaints should be filed as soon as possible after the event resulting in the complaint. Employees will not be penalized for the use of this procedure.

#### **CENTRALIZED REPORTING**

2. An asset with a cost of than \$1,000 susceptible to toss will be tagged by the purchasing department and maintained as part of a central asset reporting system for five years from date of acquisition. These assets will be included in the annual physical inventory by the purchasing department. After that period, the assets with a cost \$5,000 or less will may be purged from the central asset reporting system.

#### MAINTENANCE OF RECORDS

5. The County shall accurately maintain records of fixed assets. The Purchasing department shall be responsible for tagging assets for identification, adding the asset description and purchasing information in the asset software, attaching supporting documentation for the adds and changes in asset software, and maintaining titles and equipment listings for items that meet the centralized reporting requirements outlined in Section B 2. The-Purchasing department will enter the asset information in the asset software system. It shall be the responsibility of the Purchasing Agent to provide source documents to the County Auditors Office for the financial records. The information provided shall include a complete description of the assets including the make, model, identification number or serial number, cost, department of responsibility, date of acquisition, current condition of the asset and tag number. At least monthly, the purchasing department shall update the asset software system and shall provide documentation for all adds, changes, and deletes in the fixed assets to the County Auditor. Supporting documentation should be attached in the asset software. Department heads and elected officials shall provide information on the designated forms for recording transfers and deletions of assets as the change occurs. Records of land and rights-of-way shall be maintained in the Planning and Development Department. The County Auditor will be responsible for depreciation of assets and classification of assets for the financial reporting system. A copy of the invoice will be available to the Purchasing department. The Purchasing department will maintain current files for all assets electronically in the asset software system. A detail list of asset disposed of at auction including the asset number and tag number or id shall be provided to the County Auditor within 30 days of the auction.

# 11. DISPOSAL OF PROPERTY, TRANSFER OF PROPERTY & DELETION OF ASSETS FROM FINANCIAL REPORTS & INVENTORY LISTINGS

The Purchasing Agent will follow Local Government Code 263, SUBCHAPTER D., DISPOSTION OF SALVAGE OR SUPLUS PROPERTY for disposal of County property. Transfer of an asset not maintained in asset software system with a cost of less than \$5,000 may be transferred internally upon approval of the purchasing agent after reviewing the appropriate paperwork signed by the giving and receiving department and notification to the County Auditor.

# 2.19 POLICY ON ASSET MANAGEMENT including inventory maintained at the department level

#### FIXED ASSETS AND INVENTORY

1. A fixed asset of the County is defined as a purchased or otherwise acquired piece of equipment, furniture, fixture, capital improvement; infrastructure addition, or addition to existing land, buildings, etc. For financial reporting purposes, a fixed asset's cost or value is \$5,000 or more, with an expected useful life greater than one year infrastructure or building improvement at a cost of \$25,000 or more that will extend the life more than five years.

# Current Policy

#### **CENTRALIZED REPORTING**

2. An asset with a cost of than \$1,000 susceptible to loss will be maintained as part of a central reporting system for five years from date of acquisition. These assets will be included in the annual physical inventory by the purchasing department. After that period, the assets with a cost \$5,000 or less may be purged from the central reporting system.

#### MAINTENANCE OF PHYSICAL ASSETS

3. The County will maintain its physical assets at a level adequate to protect the County's capital investment and minimize future maintenance and replacement costs. The budget will provide for the adequate maintenance and the orderly replacement of fixed assets.

#### SAFEGUARDING OF ASSETS

4. The County's fixed assets will be reasonably safeguarded and properly accounted for. Responsibility for the safeguarding of the County's fixed assets lies with the department head or elected official in whose department the fixed asset is assigned. Each department is responsible for maintaining a list of assets in their departments.

#### MAINTENANCE OF RECORDS

5. The County shall accurately maintain records of fixed assets. The Purchasing department shall be responsible for tagging all assets for identification and maintaining titles, assigning asset numbers for items that meet the centralized reporting requirements outlined in Section 2. The Purchasing department shall maintain information in the asset software system necessary to meet the annual statutory asset inventory requirement. It shall be the responsibility of the Purchasing Agent to provide source documents to the County Auditor Office for the financial records. The written information provided shall include a complete description of the assets including the make, model, identification number or serial number, cost, department of responsibility, date of acquisition, current condition of the asset, tag number, and documents provided by the vendor and insurance carriers. Information is to be provided in a clearly marked folder identifying the asset. The purchasing department shall promptly (within 10 business days) provide the County Auditor documentation for all entries including adds, changes, and deletes.

Department heads and elected officials shall provide information on the designated forms for recording transfers and deletions of assets as the change occurs. Records of land and rights-of-way shall be maintained in the Utility Department. The County Auditor will be responsible for depreciation of assets and classification of assets for the financial reporting system. The Purchasing department will maintain current files for all tagged assets. A detail list of asset disposed of at auction including the asset number and tag number or id shall be provided to the County Auditor within 30 days of the auction.

#### MAINTENANCE OF RECORDS-ROAD AND BRIDGE PRECINCTS

6. Each Precinct shall be responsible for tagging/otherwise marking all assets for identification, maintaining a list, and supporting records for assets and inventory maintained in the

department for accountability and insurance purposes for those assets that are not maintained on the centralized assets reporting system. This list shall be made available to the Purchasing Department and County Auditor and review of assets against the listing and and documentation will be part of the annual physical inventory by the Purchasing department. A physical inventory by the Precinct shall be conducted at least once each year. On or before May 1st of each year, a full inventory of these assets and inventory shall be conducted by the Precinct, records updated, and a report of the inventory findings, and current listing provided to the Purchasing Agent and County Auditor. A Commissioner may elect to have the assets recorded in the centralized asset reporting system to assist them in their record keeping. Each commissioner shall prepare a policy for inventory management to be followed for the accountability of inventory maintained by the department.

#### MAINTENANCE OF RECORDS-FACILITIES MANAGEMENT

7. The department head responsible for facilities management shall be responsible for tagging/otherwise marking assets for identification, maintaining a list, and supporting records for assets and inventory maintained in the department for accountability and insurance purposes for those and inventory that are not maintained on the centralized assets reporting system. This list shall be made available to the Purchasing Department and County Auditor and review of assets against the listing and documentation will be part of the annual physical inventory by the Purchasing department. A physical inventory by the department head shall be conducted at least once each year. On or before May of each year, a full inventory of these assets and inventory shall be conducted by the department head, records updated, and a report of the inventory findings, and current listing provided to the Purchasing Agent and County Auditor. The department head may elect to have the assets recorded in the centralized asset reporting system to assist them in their record keeping. The department head shall prepare a policy for inventory management to be followed for the accountability of inventory maintained by the department

#### **ANNUAL INVENTORY**

8. The Purchasing Agent in accordance with state law shall perform an annual inventory of assets. The inventory should include actual viewing by the purchasing department of the assets maintained in the assets records system, unless there are specifically approved exceptions by the Commissioners' Court. Such inventory shall be performed in conjunction with the department head or elected official or a designated agent. A detailed listing shall be used and a complete review shall be made of all assigned fixed assets. A list signed by the Purchasing Agent and department head or elected official acknowledging the completeness and accuracy of the inventory shall be provided no later than July 1 of each year to the County Auditor as required by State Law.

#### INFRASTRUCTURE MAINTENANCE

9. The County recognizes that deferred maintenance increases future capital costs. Funds shall be included in the budget requests each year to maintain the quality of the County's infrastructure.

#### SCHEDULED REPLACEMENT OF ASSETS

10. As part of the ongoing replacement of assets, the County shall work towards development of an equipment replacement plan.

#### DELETION OF ASSETS FROM FINANCIAL REPORTS & INVENTORY LISTINGS

11. Assets that are disposed of by the Purchasing Agent in accordance with state law may be removed from the records upon disposal of the asset (auction, trade in, destruction etc.) and

notification made to the County Auditor. Removal for any reasons other than disposal of assets by the Purchasing agent in accordance with State Law or removal for tagged assets as defined under Section 2. of this policy requires approval of the Commissioners' Court.

## 2.22 POLICY ON MEALS, BEVERAGES AND SUPPLYING REFRESHMENTS FOR MEETINGS

# 2.22 POLICY ON MEALS, BEVERAGES AND SUPPLYING REFRESHMENTS FOR MEETINGS

## **PURPOSE**

- a. - b. Jail employees, Meals at Jail On-duty jailers due to the job assignment that prohibits them from leaving the work place may eat meals as provided by the jail. All other persons consuming food purchased by the county at the jail must reimburse the cost of the meal as determined by the sheriff. A list of persons and date along with the funds collected shall be turned in to the County Treasurer for deposit into the General Fund.
- c. Emergency situations Road & Bridge personnel and others assisting during natural disaster clean-ups (that require persons to be called out on weekends, holidays or late at night) and responders to Public Safety Emergency or Special Circumstances may be provided meals and drinks up to \$12.00 per person per meal with approval of the elected official(s) responsible for oversight of the occurrence. Documentation shall be provided.
- Inmates Jail inmate labor used routinely may be provided the following to compensate for their assistance.

Soft drinks and Gatorade

Coffee, creamer, sugar

Snack foods (cookies, crackers, candy bars, etc.)

- e. Emergency Medical Services Coffee and related supplies may be purchased and used for 24 hour duty crews.
- f. Departments under Sheriff Supervision Coffee and related supplies not provided under the Jail food contract may be purchased from County funds and used by employees during their work hours.

# 4.03 POLICY ON MINIMUM WAGE, OVERTIME PAY & COMP TIME

#### **FLSA COMPLIANCE**

1. In administering its wage and salary program, the minimum standards of Walker County shall be the basic standards set forth in the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) and its amendments as it applies to county governments. Annually, Commissions' Court sets the compensation for employees in accordance with federal, state and county policy. Walker County complies with the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) as outlined in the FLSA Safe Harbor guidelines. Law enforcement employees are treated in accordance with the 207(k) exemption of the FLSA. The Commissioners' Court has adopted this exemption. All non-exempt employees shall be paid an hourly wage.

#### **APPLICABILITY**

- 2. This policy shall apply to all employees of Walker County who are not specifically exempt from the provisions of the FLSA.
- 3. The County Judge shall be responsible, with the assistance of other elected officials and department heads, for identifying the positions exempt under the FLSA.

#### **OVERTIME**

- 4. In calculating "hours worked" for purposes of overtime computation, hours worked shall include only hours spent in the service of the County (as defined in the FLSA) and shall exclude all paid leave.
- 5. Overtime shall be all hours actually worked in excess of forty (40) for regular employees and forty-three (43) for law enforcement during the workweek and forty (40) per pay period for EMS employees (which includes vacation, comp time and holidays taken) as defined in the 4.01, Policy on Work Schedules, Workday and Workweek.

## **OVERTIME COMPENSATION**

- A non-exempt employee who works overtime during the work week shall:
- a. Have overtime accounted for at a rate of one and one-half (1 1/2) hours for each hour worked over forty (40) for regular employees during the workweek unless taken during the same week.
- b. Hours worked in a time period not eligible to be paid at the (1 1/2) overtime rate because other leave time or holidays taken during the work week will be paid at straight time or added to comp time at straight time depending on the how the department budgets for overtime.
- c. Eligible employees shall be paid in the form of comp time off in accordance with Walker County policy and the provisions of the FLSA. All other eligible employees shall receive paid comp time off at a rate of one and one half (1 ½) times the amount of overtime worked.

#### **MAXIMUM COMP TIME**

7. The maximum comp time accrual for eligible employee shall be the maximum allowed under the provision of the FLSA. (240 - regular employees)

- a. Road and Bridge employees shall be compensated in wages at a rate of one and one half (1 1/2) times their regular rate for any overtime hours worked over forty (40) hours per week and straight time for any time that, does not qualify for the one and one half (1 1/2) times their regular rate unless they otherwise note on their timesheet for the current pay period that the employee would rather accrue comp time. Road & Bridge Employees are capped at 40 hours comp time.
- b. Public Safety Combined Communication employees shall be compensated at a rate of one and one half (1 1/2) times their regular rate for any overtime hours worked over forty (40) hours per week and straight time for any time that does not qualify for the one and one half (1 1/2) times their regular rate unless they otherwise note on their timesheet for the current pay period that the employee would rather accrue comp time. WCPCC employees are capped at 40 hours comp time.
- c. EMS Certified medical personnel shall be compensated in wages at a rate of one and one half (1 1/2) times their regular rate for any overtime unless they otherwise note on their timesheet for the current pay period that the employee would rather accrue comp time. Certified medical personnel working for EMS are capped at 48 hours comp time.

#### LAW ENFORCEMENT EMPLOYEES WORKING UNDER THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE AND JAIL

- d. Overtime compensation for law enforcement employees of the County shall at least meet the minimum standards set forth in the Fair Labor Standards Act and any other federal or state legislation which applies.
- e. Law enforcement employees shall be compensated in wages at a rate of one and one-half (1 1/2) times their regular rate for any overtime worked over forty-three (43) hours per workweek.
- f. Law enforcement employees will be paid straight time for hours worked between forty (40) and forty-three (43) hours during a workweek.
- g. Law enforcement employees will be paid for comp time unless they otherwise note on their timesheet for the current pay period that they would rather accrue comp time. Law enforcement employees are capped at 40 hours comp time.
- 8. When an employee has reached the maximum comp time accrual, he/she shall be compensated in wages at a rate of one and one half (1 1/2) times they regular rate for any additional overtime hours worked until comp time has been taken to bring the balance below the maximum. Employees shall be allowed to use earned comp time within a reasonable time after it is requested provided that the employee absence will not place an undue hardship on department operations. Walker County shall have the right to require employees to use comp time at the convenience of the County.

#### **USE OF COMP TIME**

- 9 Use of comp time shall be subject to approval by the employee's supervisor.
- Comp time may be used as vacation, sick leave, or for any other reason as leave with pay.
- 11. If an individual's employment terminates before all of their earned comp time is used, he/she will be paid for all unused time at their regular rate on their final paycheck.

#### RECORD KEEPING

- 12. Each employee shall be responsible for recording any comp time taken within a pay period on the timesheet for that pay period.
- 13. The County Treasurer shall be responsible for keeping records of all comp time earned and used by eligible County employees and shall update the balance due for each employee at the end of each pay period.

#### LIST OF EXEMPT EMPLOYEES

14. The County Judge's Office and Human Resources shall maintain the official list of FLSA exempt employees as approved in Commissioner's Court.

#### PAYMENT OF OVERTIME FOR EXEMPT EMPLOYEES

15. During a major event/disaster, Exempt Employees may be paid for excessive overtime if deemed as unavoidable and necessary and approved by Commissioner's Court. The rate of pay shall be the normal hourly rate for that exempt employee.

#### **BORROWING**

16. Employees shall not be able to borrow leave time against possible future accruals.

## PAYMENT OF OVERTIME FOR NON-EXEMPT EMPLOYEES

17. Walker County shall retain the right to "buy back" all or part of an employee's unused comp time by paying the employee for that time at the employee's regular rate of pay. Walker County shall retain the right to pay all or part of the overtime worked in any work week by paying for that overtime at one and one half (1 1/2) the employee's regular rate of pay.

#### PAY AT TERMINATION

Comp time balances will be compensated at the regular rate of pay at termination.

  - b. Hours worked in a time period not eligible to be paid at the (1 1/2) overtime rate because other leave time or holidays taken during the work week will be paid at straight time or added to comp time at straight time depending on the how the department budgets for overtime.
  - c. Eligible employees shall be paid in the form of comp time off in accordance with Walker County policy and the provisions of the FLSA. All other eligible employees shall receive paid comp time off at a rate of one and one half (1 ½) times the amount of overtime worked.

#### MAXIMUM COMP TIME

- 7. The maximum comp time accrual for any employee shall be the maximum allowed under the provision of the FLSA. (240 regular employees)
- 8. When an employee has reached the maximum comp time accrual, he/she shall be compensated in wages at a rate of one and one half (1 1/2) times his/her regular rate for any additional overtime hours worked until comp time has been taken to bring the balance below the maximum. Employees shall be allowed to use earned comp time within a reasonable time after it is requested provided that the employee absence will not place an undue hardship on department operations. Walker County shall have the right to require employees to use comp time at the convenience of the County.



#### **USE OF COMP TIME**

- 9. Use of comp time shall be subject to approval by the employee's supervisor.
- 10. Comp time may be used as vacation, sick leave, or for any other reason as leave with pay.
- 11. If an individual's employment terminates before all of his/her earned comp time is used, he/she will be paid for all unused time at his/her regular rate on his/her final paycheck.

# **RECORD KEEPING**

- 12. Each employee shall be responsible for recording any comp time taken within a pay period on the time sheet for that pay period.
- 13. The County Treasurer shall be responsible for keeping records of all comp time earned and used by eligible County employees and shall update the balance due for each employee at the end of each pay period.

#### ROAD AND BRIDGE EMPLOYEES

14. Road and bridge employees shall be compensated in wages at a rate of one and one half (1 1/2) times his/her regular rate for any overtime hours worked over forty (40) hours per week and straight time for any time that, does not qualify for the one and one half (1 1/2) times his/her regular rate unless they otherwise note on their timesheet for the current pay period that the employee would rather accrue comp time. Road & Bridge Employees are capped at 40 hours comp time.

# WCPSCC (WALKER COUNTY PUBLIC SAFETY COMBINED COMMUNICATIONS) EMPLOYEE

15. WCPCC employees shall be compensated at a rate of one and one half (1 1/2) times his/her regular rate for any overtime hours worked over forty (40) hours per week and straight time for any time that does not qualify for the one and one half (1 1/2) times his/her regular rate unless they otherwise note on their timesheet for the current pay period that the employee would rather accrue comp time. WCPCC employees are capped at 40 hours comp time.

# **EMS MEDICAL PERSONNEL**

16. Certified medical personnel working for EMS shall be compensated in wages at a rate of one and one half (1 1/2) times his/her regular rate for any overtime unless they otherwise note on their timesheet for the current pay period that the employee would rather accrue comp time. Certified medical personnel working for EMS are capped at 48 hours comp time.

# LAW ENFORCEMENT EMPLOYEES WORKING UNDER THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE AND JAIL

- 17. Overtime compensation for law enforcement employees of the County shall at least meet the minimum standards set forth in the Fair Labor Standards Act and any other federal or state legislation which applies.
- 18. Law enforcement employees shall be compensated in wages at a rate of one and one-half (1 1/2) times his/her regular rate for any overtime worked over forty-three (43) hours per workweek.
- 19. Law enforcement employees will be paid straight time for hours worked between forty (40) and forty-three (43) hours during a workweek.
- 20. Law enforcement employees will be paid for comp time unless they otherwise note on their timesheet for the current pay period that they would rather accrue comp time. Law enforcement employees are capped at 40 hours comp time.

# LIST OF EXEMPT EMPLOYEES

21. The County Judge's Office and Human Resources shall maintain the official list of FLSA exempt employees as approved in Commissioners' Court.

## PAYMENT OF OVERTIME FOR EXEMPT EMPLOYEES

22. During a major event/disaster, Exempt Employees may be paid for excessive overtime if deemed as unavoidable and necessary and approved by Commissioners' Court. The rate of pay shall be the normal hourly rate for that exempt employee.

#### **BORROWING**

23. Employees shall not be able to borrow leave time against possible future accruals.

# PAYMENT OF OVERTIME FOR NON-EXEMPT EMPLOYEES

24. Walker County shall retain the right to "buy back" all or part of an employee's unused comp time by paying the employee for that time at the employee's regular rate of pay. Walker County shall retain the right to pay all or part of the overtime worked in any work week by paying for that overtime at one and on half (1 ½) the employee's regular rate of pay.

# **PAY AT TERMINATION**

25. Comp time balances will be compensated at the regular rate of pay at termination.

# 7.01 POLICY ON GRIEVANCES

#### RIGHT OF GRIEVANCE

- 1. Employees who feel they have been improperly or unfairly treated in their job or in their relationship with the County shall have the right to file a grievance. Written grievances may not be prepared on County time.
- 2. Actions or results which occur and which are beyond the control of the County shall not be considered grounds for grievance procedure.

## **GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE**

3. Grievances shall be handled in accordance with the attached grievance procedure.

#### STOPPING THE GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

- 4. Only the employee who has filed the grievance shall be able to stop the grievance procedure either by action or inaction.
- The grievance procedure shall be stopped if:
- a. The employee indicates by dated written documentation he/she is satisfied with the action to resolve the grievance at any level of the grievance procedure;
- b. The employee, for any reason, indicates by dated written documentation that he/she no longer wishes to continue the grievance procedure; or
- c. The employee fails to take action to continue with the next step of the procedure within three working days of completion of the prior step (elected official/department head will keep record of this step).

## **TIMELY FILING**

6. Grievances must be filed within five (5) working days of the occurrence of the incident causing the grievance.

# **ADVERSE ACTION**

7. No adverse action shall be taken against any employee for reason of their exercise of the right to file a grievance.

Any employee having a grievance related to their job should discuss the grievance with their immediate supervisor.

If the discussion with the immediate supervisor does not resolve the grievance, and, if the immediate supervisor is not the elected or appointed official with final responsibility for the employee's department, the employee shall have the right to discuss the grievance with that official.

The decision of the elected or appointed official with final responsibility for the employee's department shall be final in all grievances.

#### **COMBINED STEP**

#### STEP 1

- a. Employee informally discusses grievance with their supervisor.
- b. Supervisor decides what action, if any will be taken in regard to the grievance. Narrative will be written by the elected official/department head describing the grievance and any action taken or reason for no action.
- c. If STEP 1 does not result in a resolution of the grievance, the employee may precede to STEP 2, which is the first step of the formal grievance procedure, within five (5) working days after the informal discussion with their supervisor.

#### STEP 2

- a. The employee prepares a Grievance Report (WCFM-003) giving the details of the grievance and stating the specific remedial action requested.
- b. Employee physically gives Grievance Report (WCFM-003) to supervisor.
- c. Supervisor reviews the facts of the grievance, makes a decision as to what action, if any, is to be taken to resolve the grievance and communicates the decision in writing to the employee within five (5) working days after having received the grievance.
- d. If the employee is not satisfied with the decision in STEP 2 or if the supervisor fails to respond within five (5) working days, the employee may take the grievance to STEP 3 within three (3) working days.

# STEP 3

- a. The employee physically submits a written copy of the Grievance Report (WCFM-003) to the elected official/department head along with a copy of the decision made by the supervisor or a statement that the supervisor failed to provide a decision within the five (5) working day limit if such is the case.
- b. The elected official/department head reviews the details of the grievance and, within five (5) working days, provides the employee with a written statement of what action, if any, is to be taken to resolve the grievance.

This is the end of the internal grievance process.

# 7.01 POLICY ON GRIEVANCES AND GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

#### RIGHT OF GRIEVANCE

- 1. Employees who feel they have been improperly or unfairly treated in their job or in their relationship with the County shall have the right to file a grievance. Written grievances may not be prepared on County time.
- 2. Actions or results which occur and which are beyond the control of the County shall not be considered grounds for grievance procedure.

## **GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE**

3. Grievances shall be handled in accordance with the attached grievance procedure.

# STOPPING THE GRIEVANCE PROCEDURE

- 4. Only the employee who has filed the grievance shall be able to stop the grievance procedure either by action or inaction.
- 5. The grievance procedure shall be stopped if:
  - a. The employee indicates by dated written documentation he/she is satisfied with the action to resolve the grievance at any level of the grievance procedure;
  - b. The employee, for any reason, indicates by dated written documentation that he/she no longer wishes to continue the grievance procedure; or
  - c. The employee fails to take action to continue with the next step of the procedure within three working days of completion of the prior step (elected official/department head will keep record of this step).

# **TIMELY FILING**

6. Grievances must be filed within five (5) working days of the occurrence of the incident causing the grievance.

#### **ADVERSE ACTION**

7. No adverse action shall be taken against any employee for reason of his/her exercise of the right to file a grievance.

#### **COMBINED STEP**

8. If the employee's immediate supervisor is the elected official/department head, Step2 of the grievance procedure may be eliminated and the employee may go immediately to Step3 from Step1.

# STEP 1

- a. Employee informally discusses grievance with his/her supervisor.
- b. Supervisor decides what action, if any will be taken in regard to the grievance. Narrative will be written by the elected official/department head describing the grievance and any action taken or reason for no action.
- c. If Step 1does not result in a resolution of the grievance, the employee may precede to Step 2, which is the first step of the formal grievance procedure, within five (5) working days after the informal discussion with his/her supervisor.

## STEP 2

- a. The employee prepares a Grievance Report (WCFM-003) giving the details of the grievance and stating the specific remedial action requested.
- b. Employee physically gives Grievance Report (WCFM-003) to supervisor.
- c. Supervisor reviews the facts of the grievance, makes a decision as to what action, if any, is to be taken to resolve the grievance and communicates the decision in writing to the employee within five (5) working days after having received the grievance.
- d. If the employee is not satisfied with the decision in Step 2or if the supervisor fails to respond within five (5) working days, the employee may take the grievance to Step 3 within three working days.

#### STEP 3

- a. The employee physically submits a written copy of the Grievance Report (WCFM-003) to the elected official/department head along with a copy of the decision made by the supervisor or a statement that the supervisor failed to provide a decision within the five (5) day limit if such is the case.
- b. The elected official/department head reviews the details of the grievance and, within five (5) working days, provides the employee with a written statement of what action, if any, is to be taken to resolve the grievance.
- c. If the employee is not satisfied with the decision of the elected official/department head or if the department head fails to respond within five (5) working days, the employee may take the grievance to the next step within five (5) working days.
- d. For employees who work for an elected official, step 3 is the final decision.

## STEP 4

- a. The employee physically submits a copy of the Grievance Report (WCFM-003) to the County Judge or judicial authority over an appointed official along with copies of any decisions made in Steps 2and 3 or statements of a failure of the supervisor or department head to respond where such is the case.
- b. The County Judge presents the grievance to the members of the Commissioners' Court,
- c. The Commissioners' Court gathers any additional information that may be pertinent to the grievance and, by majority decision at the next regular meeting of the Court, determines what action, if any, is to be taken to resolve the grievance.
- d. The County Judge or judicial authority over an appointed official provides the employee with a written copy of the decision made by the Commissioners' Court within five (5) working days after the meeting at which the decision was made.

The completion of Step 4 is the end of the internal grievance process.

## **ORDER NO. 2025-48**

AN ORDER OF THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF WALKER COUNTY, TEXAS, AMENDING THE OPERATING AND PROJECTS BUDGETS FOR WALKER COUNTY, TEXAS, FOR THE PERIOD OCTOBER 1, 2024 THROUGH SEPTEMBER 30, 2025; AND AMENDING THE PERSONNEL ALLOCATION BUDGET BY ADDING AN SO IT SYSTEM ADMINISTRATOR POSITION AND DELETING AN IT ANALYST POSITION IN THE SHERIFF DEPARTMENT BUDGET AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE HEREOF.

- WHEREAS, Commissioners Court, after final adoption of the budget, may spend county funds only in strict compliance with the budget, except in an emergency. [Texas Local Government Code § 111.010(b)], and
- WHEREAS, Commissioners Court by order may amend the budget to transfer an amount budgeted for one item to another budgeted item without authorizing an emergency expenditure. [Texas Local Government Code § 111.010(d)], and
- WHEREAS, Capital Projects, proceeds from debt issue and other projects and equipment replacements funded in prior budgets for the Project Fund or Capital Project Fund remain allocated until completion of the project.
- WHEREAS, Special budgets for grants or aid money received by the county that are not included in this budget certified to the Commissioners Court by the County Auditor can have a special budget adopted for the limited purpose of spending the grant or aid money for its intended purpose. [Texas Local Government Code § 111.0106].
- WHEREAS, Money received from intergovernmental contracts that is available for the fiscal year but not included in this budget certified to the Commissioners Court by the County Auditor can have a special budget adopted for the limited purpose of spending the revenue from intergovernmental contracts for its intended purpose. [Texas Local Government Code § 111.0107].
- WHEREAS, Special budgets for revenue received after the start of the fiscal year that are not included in this budget certified to the Commissioners Court by the County Auditor can have a special budget adopted for the limited purpose of spending the revenues for general purposes or its intended purposes. [Texas Local Government Code § 111.0108].
- WHEREAS, Changes in the budget may be made for county purposes [Texas Local Government Code § 111.011].
- WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court now makes changes to the budget as listed on Exhibit A that it considers warranted by law or in the best interest of the county taxpayers;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF WALKER COUNTY, TEXAS, that:

- SECTION 1: Commissioners Court amends the budget for Walker County Texas for the period October 1, 2024, through September 30, 2025.
- SECTION 2: This order shall take effect immediately after its passage.

Law Enforcement Agency (LEA)

- 1) PURPOSE This State Plan of Operation (SPO) is entered into between the State/United States (U.S.) Territory and Law Enforcement Agency (as identified above), to set forth the terms and conditions which will be binding on the parties with respect to Department of Defense (DoD) excess personal property conditionally transferred pursuant to 10 USC § 2576a, in order to promote the efficient, expeditious transfer of property and to ensure accountability of the same.
- 2) AUTHORITY The Secretary of Defense (SECDEF) is authorized by 10 USC § 2576a to transfer to Federal and State Law Enforcement Agencies (LEAs), personal property that is excess to the needs of the DoD, including small arms and ammunition, that the Secretary determines is suitable to be used by such agencies in law enforcement activities, with preferences for counter-drug/counter-terrorism, disaster-related emergency preparedness or border security activities, under such terms prescribed by the Secretary. The SECDEF has delegated program management authority to the DLA. The DLA Disp Svcs LESO administers the program in accordance with (IAW) 10 USC § 2576a, 10 USC § 280, DoDM 4160.21 and DLAI 4140.11. The DLA defines "law enforcement activities" as activities performed by governmental agencies whose primary function is the enforcement of applicable federal, State, and local laws and whose compensated law enforcement officers have powers of arrest and apprehension.
- 3) GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS "DoD excess personal property" also known as "items", "equipment", "program property", or "property". "DLA Disposition Services Law Enforcement Support Office" also known as "1033 Program", "LESO Program", "the program", or "LESO". "State or U.S. Territory" also known as "the State", "State Coordinator (SC)", "State Point of Contact (SPOC)", or "SC/SPOC". "Law Enforcement Activities" also known as "agencies in law enforcement activities", "Law Enforcement Agency (LEA)", "program participant", or "State/LEA".
  - a) Property made available under this agreement is not for personal use and is for the use of authorized program participants only. All requests for property shall be based on bona fide law enforcement requirements. Authorized participants who receive property from the program will not loan, donate, or otherwise provide property to other groups or entities (i.e., public works, county garage, schools, etc.) that are not otherwise authorized to participate in the program. Property will not be obtained by program participants for the purpose of sale, lease, loan, personal use, rent, exchange, barter, transfer, or to secure a loan. To receive such property, on an annual basis the LEA shall certify that they have:
    - i) Obtained authorization of the relevant local governing body authority (i.e., city council, mayor, etc.).
    - ii) Adopted publicly available protocols for the appropriate use of controlled property, the supervision, and the evaluation of the effectiveness of such use, including auditing and accountability policies.
    - iii) Annual training in place and provides it to relevant personnel on the maintenance, sustainment, and appropriate use of controlled property, including respect for the rights of citizens under the Constitution of the U.S. and de-escalation of force.
  - b) All costs associated with the transportation, turn-in, transfer, repair, maintenance, insurance, disposal, repossession or other expenses related to property are the sole responsibility of the State/LEA. The State/LEA shall also be responsible to reimburse the U.S Government (USG) for costs incurred in retrieving and/or repossessing property impermissibly transferred by the State/LEA to unauthorized participants.

- c) The State/LEA will maintain and enforce regulations designed to impose adequate security and accountability measures for controlled property to mitigate the risk of loss or theft of property. Program participants shall implement controls to ensure property made available under this agreement is used for official law enforcement use only. The State/LEA shall take appropriate administrative and/or disciplinary action against individuals that violate provisions of the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between the Federal Government and the State/U.S. Territory and/or this SPO, including unauthorized use of property.
- d) All property transferred to the State/LEA via the program is on an as-is, where-is basis.
- e) LESO reserves the right to recall property issued to a State/LEA at any time.
- f) General use of definitions/terms:
  - i) Demilitarization (DEMIL code)-a code assigned to DoD property that indicates the degree of required physical destruction, identifies items requiring specialized capabilities or procedures, and identifies items which do not require DEMIL but may require Trade Security Controls (TSC). Program participants are not authorized to conduct physical demilitarization of property.
  - ii) "Controlled property"-items with a DEMIL code of B, C, D, E, F, G, and Q (with an Integrity Code of "3". Title and ownership of controlled property remains with the DoD in perpetuity and will not be relinquished to the State/LEA. When a State/LEA no longer has a legitimate law enforcement use for controlled property, they shall notify the LESO, and the property will be transferred to another program participating State/LEA (via standard transfer process) or returned to DLA Disp Svcs for disposition.
  - iii) "Non-controlled" property"-items with a DEMIL code of A or Q (with an Integrity Code of "6"). These items are conditionally transferred to the State/LEA and will remain on State/LEA accountable inventory for one year from the ship date. However, after one year from the ship date, DLA will relinquish ownership and title for the property to the State/LEA without issuance of further documentation. During this one year period, the State/LEA remains responsible for the accountability and physical control of the property and the LESO retains the right to recall the property. Participants should return any property in this one year period that becomes excess to their needs or they otherwise determine is not serviceable.
    - (1) The LEA receives title and ownership of DEMIL "A" and "Q6" property as governmental entities. Title and ownership of this property does not pass from DoD to any private individual or State/LEA official in their private capacity. Such property shall be maintained and ultimately disposed of IAW provisions in State and local laws that govern public property.
    - (2) Sales/gifting of DEMIL"A" and "Q6" property after one year from the ship date inconsistent with State/local law may constitute grounds to deny future participation in the program.
    - (3) After one year from ship date, DEMIL "A" and "Q6" property may be transferred, cannibalized for usable parts, sold, donated, or scrapped.
    - (4) Once the property is no longer on the LEA accountable inventory, the property is no longer subject to the annual physical inventory requirements and will not be inventoried during a LESO Program Compliance Review (PCR).
- g) All physical transfers of property require LESO approval. Program participants will not physically transfer property until the LESO approval process is complete. Program participants may request their SC/SPOC approval to temporarily conditionally loan property to another program participant (if mission requires). If the SC/SPOC approves the temporary conditional loan, it shall be done using an acceptable Equipment Custody Receipt (ECR). At the end of the temporary conditional loan, the item (s) shall be returned to the original LEA for accountability. All requests for conditional loans will be based on bona fide law enforcement requirements.

- h) The program may authorize digital signatures on required program documentation.
- i) The State/LEA is not required to maintain insurance on controlled property, aircraft or other property with special handling requirements that remain titled to DoD. However, the State/LEA will be advised that if they elect to carry insurance and the insured property is on the program inventory at the time of loss or damage, the recipient will submit a check made payable to DLA for insurance proceeds received in excess of their actual costs of acquiring and rehabilitating the property prior to its loss, damage, or destruction.

# 4) STATE PLAN OF OPERATION The State shall:

- a) Assist in training LEAs with enrollment, property requests, transfers, turn-ins, and disposal procedures.
- b) Adhere to the requirements outlined in the MOA between the Federal Government and the State/U.S. Territory and ensure MOA amendments or modifications are incorporated into this SPO and program participants are notified and acknowledge responsibility to comply with changes.
- c) Submit a SPO to LESO that shall address procedures for determining LEA eligibility, allocation, equitable distribution of property, accountability, inventory, training, and education, State-level internal PCRs, export control requirements, procedures for turn-in, transfer, and disposal and other responsibilities concerning property.
- d) Enter into written agreement with each LEA, via the LESO-approved SPO, to ensure program participants acknowledge the terms, conditions, and limitations applicable to property. This SPO must be signed by the current Chief Law Enforcement Official (CLEO) (or designee) and the current SC/SPOC.
- e) Provide program participants the following information:

- iii) Funding to administer the LESO Program at the State-level is provided via:
- iv) The Governor of the State of Texas has appointed the Texas Department of Public of Public Safety to conduct management, and oversight of this program. All funding and staffing will be provided by the Texas Department, of Public Safety

- 5) PROPERTY ACCOUNTING SYSTEM The State will maintain access to Federal Excess Property Management Information System (FEPMIS) (or current property accounting system), to ensure LEAs maintain property books, to include, but not limited to, transfers, turn-ins, and disposal requests from an LEA or to generate these requests at the State-level and forward all approvals to the LESO for action. The State will:
  - a) Conduct quarterly reconciliations of State property records.
  - b) Ensure at least one person per LEA maintains access to the property accounting system. Users may be "active" or "inactive" in the system, so long as they are registered. Ensure registered users are employees of the State/LEA.
  - c) Ensure LEAs receive and account for property in the property accounting system within 30 days.
- 6) LESO WEBSITE The State shall access the LESO website for timely and accurate guidance, information, and links concerning the program and ensure that all relevant information is passed to the program participants.
- 7) ANNUAL TRAINING 10 USC § 280 provides that the SECDEF, in cooperation with the U.S. Attorney General, shall conduct an annual briefing of law enforcement personnel of each State (including law enforcement personnel of the political subdivisions of each State). Individuals who wish to attend are responsible for funding their own travel expenses. The briefing will include information on training, technical support, equipment, and facilities that are available to civilian law enforcement personnel from the DoD. The state shall provide program participants training material as discussed during the annual LESO training which includes information on property management best practices to include (but not limited to) searching for property, accounting for property on inventory, transfer and turn-in of property when it is no longer needed or serviceable.
- 8) ENROLLMENT The LESO shall establish and implement program eligibility criteria IAW 10 USC § 2576a, DLA Instructions and Manuals and this SPO and retains final approval/disapproval authority for application packages forwarded by the State. Non-governmental law enforcement entities such as private railroad police, private security, private academies, correctional departments, prisons, or security police at private schools/colleges are not eligible to participate. Fire departments (by definition) are not eligible to participate and should be referred to the DLA Fire Fighter program administered by USDA. Law enforcement agencies requesting program participation shall have at least one full-time law enforcement officer. Program property may only be issued to full-time/part-time law enforcement officers. Non-compensated reserve officers are not authorized to receive property. State law enforcement training facilities/ academies may be authorized to participate in the program given their primary function is the training of bona fide State/local law enforcement officers. Law enforcement training facilities/academies will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis. The State shall:
  - a) Validate the authenticity of state/LEAs that are applying for program participation. Only submit to the LESO those application packages that the SC/SPOC recommends/certifies are government agencies whose primary function is the enforcement of applicable federal, State, and local laws and whose compensated officers have the powers of arrest and apprehension. If the State forwards an unauthorized participant application package, this may result in a formal suspension of the State.
  - b) Have sole discretion to disapprove state/LEA application packages in their State. The SC/SPOC should provide notification to the LESO when application packages are disapproved at the State-level.
  - c) Ensure that screeners listed in the application package are employees of the LEA. A screener may only screen property for two LEAs. Contractors may not conduct screening on behalf of a LEA.
  - d) Make recommendation on what constitutes a "full-time" or "part-time" law enforcement officer.

- e) Ensure LEAs update their account information annually, or as needed. This may require the LEA to submit an updated application package shall be submitted for (but is not limited to) the following: a change in CLEO, the addition or removal of a screener, a change in the LEA physical address or contact information, etc.
- f) Provide the LEA a comprehensive program overview once approved by the LESO for enrollment. The overview will be done within 90-days of a LEA being approved to participate.

# 9) PROPERTY ALLOCATION

# a) The LESO shall:

- i) Upon receipt of a SC/SPOC validated request for property through the RTD website, will review and give preference to requisitions indicating that the requested property will be used in the counter-drug, counter-terrorism, disaster-related emergency preparedness, or border security activities of the requesting LEA. Program participants that request vehicles used for disaster-related emergency preparedness, such as high-water rescue vehicles, should receive the highest preference.
- ii) Require additional justification for small arms, aircraft, ammunition, and vehicles and to the greatest extent possible, ensure fair and equitable distribution of property based on current LEA inventory and justification for property.
- iii) Reserve the right to determine and/or adjust allocation limits, to include the type, quantity and location of property allocated to the State/LEA. Generally, no more than one item (per part-time/full-time officer) will be allocated. Quantity exceptions may be granted by the LESO on a case-by-case basis based on the justification provided by the LEA. Currently, the following allocation limits apply:
  - (1) Robots: one (of each type) for every ten officers (full-time/part-time).
  - (2) High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicle (HMMWV)/Up-Armored HMMWV (UAH): one vehicle for every three officers (full-time/part-time).
  - (3) Mine Resistant Ambush Protected (MRAP) / Armored Vehicles: two vehicles per LEA.
  - (4) Small arms: one (of each type) per officer (full-time/part-time).
    - (a) LESO may authorize over allocations of small arms in preparation for inevitable scenarios, i.e., training, equipment downtime (damage, routine maintenance, inspections) or other law enforcement needs. The chart below is the standard for small arms acceptable over-allocations:

1-10	2 or less			
11-25	3 or less			
26-100	5 or less

300 or more	10 or less			

- (b) In instances where small arm allocation amounts exceed the "acceptable over-allocation" levels, the LESO will coordinate with States to verify accuracy of the officer count. If small arm allocation is still beyond acceptable levels, LESO may authorize one of the following:
- 1) an exception to policy, 2) a transfer, or 3) a turn-in.

# b) The State shall:

- i) Assist the LEA in the use of electronic screening of property via the RTD website and shall access the RTD website a minimum of once daily (Monday-Friday) to review and process LEA requests for property. Property justifications shall be validated to ensure they meet the intent of 10 USC § 2576a as suitable for use by agencies in law enforcement activities. Prior to approving a request or transfer, review the LEAs property allocation report to prevent over allocation.
- ii) Upon receipt of a valid LEA request for property, provide a recommendation to the LESO on the preference to be given to those requisitions for property that will be used in counter-drug, counter-terrorism, disaster-related emergency preparedness or border security activities of the recipient agency. Requests for vehicles used for disaster-related emergency preparedness, such as high-water rescue vehicles, should receive the highest preference. The State shall consider the fair and equitable distribution of property based on current LEA inventory and LEA justifications for property. The State shall ensure the type and quantity of property being requested by LEAs is reasonable and justifiable given the number of officers (full-time/part-time) and prior requisitions for similar items they have received (both controlled and non-controlled property). Generally, no more than one of any item per officer (full-time/part-time) will be allocated.
- 10) PROPERTY MANAGEMENT Certain controlled equipment shall have a documented chain of custody (i.e., an acceptable ECR), including a signature of the recipient. Controlled property requiring an ECR: small arms (including parts and accessories), aircraft, vehicles, optics, and robots. It is encouraged to utilize ECRs for all controlled property. LEAs may request cannibalization on aircraft or vehicles. Cannibalization requests shall be submitted to the State for review. Cannibalization must be approved by the LESO prior to any cannibalization actions. The cannibalized end item shall be returned to DLA Disp Svcs within the timeframes determined by the LESO.
  - a) Aircraft-Aircraft will not be obtained by LEAs for the purpose of sale, lease, loan, personal use, rent, exchange, barter, transfer, or to secure a loan and shall be reported to the LESO at the end of their useful life. All aircraft are considered controlled property, regardless of DEMIL code. Aircraft that are no longer needed or serviceable shall be reported to the General Services Administration (GSA) for final disposition by the LESO Program Aircraft Specialist.
  - b) Vehicles-Program participants that request vehicles used for disaster-related emergency preparedness, such as highwater rescue vehicles, should receive the highest preference. Vehicles will not be obtained by LEAs for the purpose of sale, lease, loan, personal use, rent, exchange, barter, transfer, or to secure a loan and vehicles that are considered controlled property will be returned to DLA Disp Svcs at the end of their useful life. DLA Disp Svcs Field Activity/Site will identify qualifying DEMIL A or Q6 vehicles and may issue (upon LEA request) a Standard Form (SF) SF-97 to the LEA upon physical transfer of the vehicle. The LEA may modify the vehicle during the one year conditional transfer period.
  - c) Ammunition-LESO will support the U.S. Army (USA), in allocating ammunition to program participants. Ammunition obtained via the program will be for training use only. At the time of request, the LEA will certify in writing that the ammunition will be used for training use/purposes only. The USA will issue approved transfers directly to the State/LEA. The State/LEA is responsible for funding all packing, crating, handling, and shipping costs for ammunition. The LEA will make reimbursements directly to the USA. Ammunition will not be obtained by LEAs for the purpose of sale, lease, loan, personal use, rent, exchange, barter, transfer, or to secure a loan. Ammunition obtained via the program shall not be sold. Ammunition will be treated as a consumable item and not tracked in any DLA inventory system or inspected during PCRs. LESO shall track and maintain necessary records of ammunition that has been transferred to LEAs and will post all requests, approvals, and denials on the LESO public website.

# d) Small arms:

- i) Small arms will not be obtained by LEAs for the purpose of sale, lease, loan, personal use, rent, exchange, barter, transfer, or to secure a loan and shall be returned to DLA Disp Svcs at the end of their useful life. Cannibalization of small arms is not authorized.
- ii) Temporary modifications to small arms are authorized; permanent modifications to small arms are not authorized (i.e., drilling holes in the lower receiver of a small arm). In cases of temporary modifications, all parts are to be retained and accounted for in a secured location under the original serial number for the small arm until final disposition is determined. If the modified small arm is transferred to another LEA, all parts will accompany the small arm to the receiving LEA.
- iii) Small arms will be issued utilizing an acceptable ECR which obtains certain information about the property being issued to include (but is not limited to) the signature of the law enforcement officer who is accepting responsibility for the small arm(s), the serial number of the small arm, the date in which the law enforcement officer took possession of the small arm, etc.
- iv) Small arms that are not carried on an officer's person or in the officer's immediate physical vicinity will be secured using "two levels of physical security". Two levels of physical security meaning two distinct lockable barriers, each specifically designed to render a small arm inaccessible and unusable to unauthorized persons. Lockable barriers meeting this description may be either manual or electronic.
- v) Program participants no longer requiring program small arm(s) shall request authorization to transfer the small arm to another participating LEA or request authorization to turn-in/return the small arm. Transfers and turn-in requests shall receive final approval from the LESO; small arms will not physically move until the LESO provides official notification that the approval process is complete. When turning-in small arms to Anniston Army Depot, the LEA shall follow LESO turn-in guidance.
- vi) Local destruction (DEMIL) of small arms is not authorized.
- vii) Lost, Stolen or Destroyed (LSD) small arms:
  - (1) Program participants with multiple instances of LSD small arms in a five-year window will be assessed by DLA Disp Svcs to determine if a systemic problem exists IAW DLAI 4140.11.
  - (2) DLA OIG investigations may be initiated if small arms are improperly disposed of or become LSD while in program inventory. The State/LEA may be required to reimburse DLA the fair market value of the small arms when negligence, willful misconduct, or a violation of the MOA between the Federal Government and the State/U.S. Territory and/or this SPO is confirmed at the conclusion of the Financial Liability Investigation of Property Loss (FLIPL).
    - (a) Reimbursement will be within 60-days of the completion of the FLIPL.
    - (b) Title will never transfer to the recipient regardless of the status of the small arm.
    - (c) Payments due to DLA Disp Svcs, based upon the findings of the FLIPL, may be paid by one of three methods: 1) credit card via pay.gov, 2) cashier/ business check, or 3) wire transfer.
  - (3) In instances of LSD small arm recovery, DoD retains title in perpetuity and the small arm shall be immediately relinquished/surrendered back to the program.

## 11) PROGRAM COMPLIANCE REVIEWS (PCR)

# a) The LESO shall:

- i) Conduct PCRs to ensure that the SC/SPOC, and all LEAs within a State are compliant with the terms and conditions of the program as required by 10 USC § 2576a, the MOA between the Federal Government and the State/U.S. Territory and/or this SPO and any DLA Instructions and manuals regarding the program. PCRs are conducted to ensure property accountability, program compliance, and program eligibility.
- ii) Conduct PCRs for participating States every 2 years, providing training to the State/LEA as needed.
- iii) Reserve the right to conduct no notice PCRs, or require an annual review, or similar inspection, on a more frequent basis for any State/LEA.
- iv) Intend to physically inventory 100% of property selected for review at each LEA during a PCR. The use of ECRs in lieu of physical inspection is discouraged during PCRs. Extensive use of the ECR (without prior coordination with LESO) may result in a non-compliance finding during the PCR.
- v) Intend to review as much property as possible during a PCR.
  - (1) The goal is to review 20% of a State's overall small arms inventory.
  - (2) The goal for inventory selections (at LEAs selected for review) is 15% of an LEAs general property to include non-controlled property (DEMIL code A and Q6).
- vi) Select LEAs not visited during the last three regularly scheduled PCR cycles (as applicable).
- vii) Recommend corrective actions (which may include suspending a State/LEA from program participation) for findings of non-compliance identified during a PCR.
  - (1) The LESO shall issue corrective actions (with suspense dates) to the State, which will identify what is needed to rectify the identified deficiencies within the State/LEA.
  - (2) If the State/LEA fails to correct identified deficiencies within the LESO suspense dates, the LESO may move to restrict, suspend, or terminate the State/LEA from program participation.
  - (3) States found non-compliant for a PCR will be suspended for a minimum of 60-days and will not be reinstated until the State successfully passes a LESO-conducted PCR.
- viii) Ensure the State/LEA understand that property shall be transferred to a participating agency with SC/SPOC and LESO approval or returned to DLA Disp Svcs when no longer needed or serviceable.

#### b) The State shall:

- i) Assist the LESO as required, prior to, during and upon completion of the PCR.
- ii) Assist in the coordination of the PCR daily schedule of events and forward the schedule to LEAs that have been selected for review.
- iii) Contact LEAs that have been selected for the PCR via phone, email or in person to ensure they are aware of the schedule and are prepared for the PCR.

- iv) Receive inventory selections from the LESO and forward them to the selected LEAs. The State shall ensure the LEA physically gathers the selected property in a central location (to the greatest extent possible) which will allow the LESO to physically inventory the property efficiently during the PCR.
- v) Coordinate the use of any ECR with the LESO prior to the PCR.
- vi) Ensure LEAs understand property shall be transferred to a participating agency with SC and LESO approval or returned to DLA Disp Svcs when deemed no longer needed or serviceable.
- vii) Conduct State-level (internal) PCRs of participating LEAs to ensure property accountability, program compliance and program eligibility utilizing a PCR checklist provided by the LESO, or equivalent (for uniformity purposes).
  - (1) Ensure a State-level (internal) PCR of at least 8% of LEAs with program inventory is completed annually (3% of which will be focused on program participants with no controlled property). Results of the State-level (internal) PCR will be kept on-file with the State. Documentation shall be provided to the LESO for each LEA that received a State-level PCR.
  - (2) The State-level (internal) PCR will include, at minimum:
    - (a) A review of the dually-signed SPO, ensuring it is uploaded to the property accounting system.
    - (b) A review of the LEA application package to confirm authenticity and eligibility of the LEA.
    - (c) An inventory of property selected for review at each LEA.
    - (d) A review of each selected LEA files for any of the following which may include turn-in/transfer DD Form 1348-1A, ECR, small arm documentation, FLIPL documents, exception to policy letters, approved cannibalization requests, or other pertinent documentation as required.
  - (3) Request that the LESO restrict, suspend, or terminate an LEA based on findings during State-level internal PCR or due to non-compliance with terms of the MOA between the Federal Government and the State/U.S. Territory and/or this SPO, DLA Instruction/Manual or any statute or regulation regarding the program.
  - (4) Notify the LESO and initiate an investigation into any questionable activity or action involving property issued to a LEA that comes to the attention of the State and is otherwise within the authority of the Governor/State to investigate. Upon conclusion of any such investigation, take appropriate action and/or make appropriate recommendations on restriction, suspension, or termination of the State/LEA to the LESO. The SC may suspend or terminate a State/LEA participation in the program at any time for non-compliance.
- - a) Provide training to LEAs to properly conduct the annual physical inventory and complete the certification of property in the property accounting system.
  - b) Ensure an approved and current SPO is uploaded in the property accounting system for each LEA.
  - c) Validate the annual physical inventory certifications submitted by LEAs.

- d) Adhere to annual physical inventory certification requirements as identified by the LESO. Physical inventories and certification statements will be maintained on file IAW the DLA records schedule.
- e) Annually certify property is utilized and is within allocation limits IAW the MOA between the Federal Government and the State/U.S. Territory and this SPO.
- f) Recommend suspension of program participants who fail to complete or submit the certified annual physical inventory.
- 13) REPORTING LOST, STOLEN, OR DESTROYED (LSD) PROPERTY Any property identified as LSD on a LEA current inventory, shall be reported to the State/LESO. A FLIPL (aka the DD Form 200) shall be submitted to the State/LESO for LSD property. Program participants agree to cooperate with investigations into LSD property by any federal, state, or local investigative body and, when requested, assist with recovery of LSD property.
  - a) LSD controlled property shall be reported to the State/LESO within 24-hours. Program participants may be required to provide their SC/SPOC additional documentation which may include (but is not limited to):
  - 1) Comprehensive police report, 2) NCIC report/entry, and 3) Contact information for the Civilian Governing Body (CGB) over the LEA involved, to include: Title, Name, Email, and mailing address.
  - b) LSD property with a DEMIL code of "A" and "Q6" shall be reported to the State/LESO within 7-days.
- 14) RESTRICTION, SUSPENSION OR TERMINATION Program participants are required to abide by the terms and conditions of the MOA between the Federal Government and the State/U.S. Territory and this SPO in order to maintain active program participation status. If a State/LEA fails to comply with any term or condition of the MOA, SPO, DLA Instruction or Manual, federal statute or regulation, the State/LEA may be suspended, terminated, or placed on restricted status. Restriction, suspension, or termination notifications will be in writing and will identify remedial measures required for reinstatement (if applicable). <u>Suspension</u>-A specified period in which an entire State/LEA is prohibited from requesting or receiving additional property through the program. Additional requirements may be implemented, to include the State/LEA requirement to return specifically identified controlled property. Suspensions will be for a minimum of 60-days. <u>Termination</u>-The removal of a State/LEA from program participation. The terminated State/LEA shall transfer or turn-in all controlled property previously received through the program at the expense of the State/LEA involved. <u>Restricted Status-A</u> specified period in which a State/LEA is restricted from receiving an item or commodity due to isolated issues with the identified item or commodity. Restricted status may also include restricting a State/LEA from all controlled property.
  - a) State termination-The SC/SPOC will coordinate with LESO to identify a realistic timeframe to complete the transfer or turn-in of all property. The LESO retains final authority to determine timeframe requirements.
  - b) LEA termination-The SC/SPOC will coordinate with LESO to identify a realistic timeframe to complete the transfer or turn-in of all property. The LESO retains final authority to determine timeframe requirements.
  - c) In the event of a termination, the State/LEA will make every attempt to transfer the property of the terminated State/LEA to an authorized State/LEA, as applicable, prior to requesting a turn-in of the property to DLA Disp Svcs. In cases that require a repossession or turn-in of property, the State/LEA will bear all expenses related to the repossession, turn-in or transfer of property to DLA Disp Svcs.

# d) The State shall:

i) Suspend LEAs for a minimum of 60-days in all situations relating to the suspected or actual abuse of property or requirements and/or repeated non-compliance related to the terms and conditions of this SPO. Suspension may lead to termination. The State shall also issue corrective action guidance to the LEA with

suspense dates to rectify issues and/or discrepancies that caused the restriction, suspension, or termination. The State shall require the LEA to submit results on completed police investigations and/or reports on LSD property to include the LEA CAP. The LESO retains final discretion on reinstatement requests. Reinstatement to full participation from a restriction, suspension or termination is not automatic.

- ii) Initiate corrective action to rectify suspensions or terminations of the LEA for non-compliance to the terms and conditions of the program. The State shall also make contact (until resolved) with suspended LEAs to ensure corrective actions are rectified within required timeframes provided by the LESO.
- iii) Require the LEA to complete and submit results on completed police investigations or reports regarding LSD property. The State will submit all documentation to LESO upon receipt.
- iv) Provide documentation to LESO when actionable items are rectified for the State/LEA.
- v) Request that the LESO suspend or terminate an LEA based upon their findings during State-level internal PCR or due to non-compliance with any term of this SPO, DLA Instruction/Manual or any statute or regulation regarding the program.
- vi) Notify the LESO and initiate an investigation into any questionable activity or action involving property issued to an LEA that comes to the attention of the State and is otherwise within the authority of the Governor/State to investigate. Upon conclusion of any such investigation, take appropriate action and/or make appropriate recommendations on restriction, suspension, or termination of the LEA to the LESO. The SC may revoke or terminate concurrence for LEA participation in the program at any time.
- vii) Provide written request to the LESO for reinstatement of an LEA for full participation status at the conclusion of a restriction or suspension period. Written verification shall be provided that the SC/SPOC has validated the LEA CAP.
- 15) RECORDS MANAGEMENT The LESO, SC/SPOC, and LEAs participating in the program will maintain program records IAW the DLA records schedule. Records for property acquired through the program have retention controls based on the DEMIL code. Property records will be filed, retained, and destroyed IAW DLA records schedule. Records may include but are not limited to: DD Form 1348-1A for transfers, turn-ins, requisitions, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (BATFE) Forms 5 and 10.
- 16) TRADE SECURITY CONTROL (TSC) and COMPLIANCE WITH EXPORT CONTROL REGULATIONS Items transferred to program participants, including DEMIL A and Q (with an Integrity Code of 6) property, may be subject to export control restrictions. Program participants shall comply with U.S. export control laws and regulations if they contemplate further transfers of any property. Once title transfers, LEAs should consult with the Department of State (DoS) and Department of Commerce (DoC) export control regulators about the type of export controls that may apply to items, regardless of DEMIL code. Program participants may request a formal Commodity Classification from the DoC, Bureau of Industry and Security (BIS), or submit a general correspondence request to the DoS, Directorate of Defense Trade Controls. Information on managing exports of CCL items can be found at the U.S. DoC Bureau of Industry and Security website. Program participants shall notify all subsequent purchasers or transferees, in writing, of their responsibility to comply with U.S. export control laws and regulations.
- 17) NOTICES Any notices, communications, or correspondence related to this SPO shall be provided by email, the U.S. Postal Service (USPS), express service, or facsimile to the appropriate DLA office. The LESO may (from time to time) make unilateral modifications or amendments to the provisions of the MOA between the Federal Government and the State/U.S. Territory and/or this SPO. Notice of these changes will be provided to the State in writing. Unless the State takes immediate action to terminate the MOA between the Federal Government and the State/U.S. Territory and/or this SPO, such modifications or amendments will become binding. In such cases, reasonable opportunity will (insofar as practicable) be afforded the State/LEA to conform to changes affecting their operations.

- 18) ANTI-DISCRIMINATION By signing or accepting property, the State/LEA pledges agreement to comply with provisions of the national policies prohibiting discrimination: 1) On the basis of race, color, or national origin, in Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 USC 2000d et seq.) as implemented by DoD regulations 32 CR Part 195, 2)On the basis of age, in the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 (42 USC 6101, et seq) as implemented by Department of Health and Human Services regulations in 45 CFR Part 90 and 3) On the basis of handicap, in Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, P.L. 93-112, as amended by the Rehabilitation Act Amendments of 1974, P.L. 93-516 (29 USC 794), as implemented by Department of Justice (DoJ) regulations in 28 CFR Part
- 41 and DoD regulations at 32 CFR Part 56. These elements are the minimum essential ingredients for establishment of a satisfactory business agreement between the State and the DoD.
- 19) INDEMNIFICATION CLAUSE The State/LEA is required to maintain adequate liability insurance to cover damages or injuries to persons or property relating to the use of property issued under the program. Self-insurance by the State/LEA is considered acceptable. The USG assumes no liability for damages or injuries to any person(s) or property arising from the use of property issued under the program. It is recognized that State and local law generally limit or preclude the State/LEA from agreeing to open ended indemnity provisions. However, to the extent permitted by State and local laws, the State/LEA shall indemnify and hold the USG harmless from any and all actions, claims, debts, demands, judgments, liabilities, cost, and attorney's fees arising out of, claimed on account of, or in any manner predicated upon loss of, or damage to property and injuries, illness or disabilities to, or death of any and all persons whatsoever, including members of the general public, or to the property of any legal or political entity including States, local and interstate bodies, in any manner caused by or contributed to by the State/LEA, its agents, servants, employees, or any person subject to its control while the property is in the possession of, used by, or subject to the control of the State/LEA, its agents, servants, or employees after the property has been removed from USG control.
- 20) TERMINATION This SPO may be terminated by either party, provided the other party receives a thirty (30) day notice (in writing) or as otherwise stipulated by Public Law. The undersigned SC hereby agrees to comply with all provisions set forth herein and acknowledges that any violation of the terms and conditions of this SPO may be grounds for immediate termination and possible legal consequences, to include pursuit of criminal prosecution if so warranted.

#### To Whom it May Concern:

We would like to request a revision of the submittal fees associated with the Peach Creek Development Section 1, which came to fruition prior to the current Walker County Schedule of Fees. Based on our reading of the "Schedule of Fees for Department of Planning and Development" adopted 8/28/23, it appears that a different fee is now applicable. We believe this adjustment would reflect the intent of the County's policies and therefore would like to formally request that the Peach Creek Development utilize current Walker County plat submittal fee structure.

For example, our Section 1 plat consists of 138 lots and 46.63 Acres and below is a breakdown of the difference in fees between the pre-8/28/23 fee schedule and current:





Additionally, the previous Owner already submitted a Section 1 plat application fee and used 1 review, but he showed a land plan of 199 Lots and 8,300 LF of roadway. We estimate that the fee he already paid would be as follows:

- With Construction: \$600 + (\$50 \*(199 lots -4)) + (\$1 \* 8,300 LF) + (1.5% \* \$2,500,000) = \$56,150
- Without Construction: \$600 + (\$50 \*(199 lots -4)) + (\$1 \* 8,300 LF) = \$18,650

If the Walker County Commissioners Court is aligned that the current Walker County plat submittal fee structure to be applied to the Peach Creek Development, then the Section 1 submittal would owe the difference between the original Owner's already paid fee vs the fee under the current regulations following our proposed land plan as follows:

- With Construction (assuming original Owner paid their Construction portion): \$41,570.88 \$56,150 = -\$14,579.12 (credit)
- Without Construction (assuming original Owner did not pay their Construction portion): \$41,570.88 \$18,650 = \$22,920.88 (owed)

In addition to Section 1, we understand future sections would also follow the current Walker County plat submittal fee structure. We greatly appreciate your consideration of this request and are happy to provide any additional documentation or clarification needed to assist with your review.

As you know, soft and saturated soils at the Peach Creek Forest site have prevented us from drilling the planned borings for Phase 1. This memorandum provides preliminary recommendations for the planned retaining walls and roadways based on the information obtained for our preliminary geotechnical evaluation, as presented in our report "Preliminary Geotechnical Evaluation, Peach Creek Forest, State Highway 150 and Jim Browder Loop, New Waverly, Texas," dated October 30, 2023.

#### **Retaining Wall Recommendations**

Based on plans dated January 23, 2025, we understand the planned retaining walls will be up to about 6 feet in height. The retaining walls may be supported on continuous footings bearing on native soils at a depth of 2 feet or more below finished grade or below the scour depth, whichever is deeper. Such footings may be designed using a preliminary allowable bearing pressure of 2,000 pounds per square foot (psf).

The recommended bearing depth assumes the slope below the toe of the wall is inclined at 10:1 (horizontal:vertical) or flatter. Where the slope below the toe of the wall is inclined between 4:1 (horizontal:vertical) and 10:1, the footings should bear at a depth of 3 feet or more below finished grade. Slopes below the toe of the wall steeper than 4:1 (horizontal:vertical) should not be used.

We recommend measures be taken so that moisture does not build up behind the retaining walls. Drainage measures should include free-draining backfill material and perforated drainpipes or weep holes. The drain rock and pipe should be wrapped in filter fabric, such as Mirafi 140N or equivalent. Free-draining granular fill material should be a clean, non-plastic, relatively well-graded granular backfill consisting of sand, gravel, or a sand and gravel mixture with less than 10 percent finer than the No. 200 sieve size. To reduce surface water seepage into the free draining, granular backfill, the top 1-foot of the backfill should consist of onsite clay soils with a plasticity index 25 or more.

Assuming a level surface above the wall and proper drainage behind the wall, the walls may be preliminarily designed assuming equivalent fluid pressures of 40 pounds per cubic foot (pcf) for active conditions and 60 pcf for at-rest conditions if silty sand backfill soils are used. If the onsite clays are used as retaining wall backfill, equivalent fluid pressures of 70 pcf for active conditions and 90 pcf for at-rest conditions should be used. These values do not include hydrostatic pressure, as we understand the 100-year flood level will be no more than about 1-foot above the toe of the walls.

For passive resistance to lateral loads, we recommend a triangular shaped equivalent fluid pressure be used, applied to the face of the footing and/or stem of the wall. This equivalent fluid pressure should increase from 0 to no more than 1,500 psf at a rate of 150 psf per foot of depth. We recommend the upper 12 inches of soil not protected by pavement or a concrete slab be neglected when calculating passive resistance.

For frictional resistance to lateral loads, we recommend that a coefficient of friction of 0.25 be used between soil and concrete. If passive and frictional resistances are to be used in combination, we recommend the passive resistance be reduced by one-half.

#### **Pavement Recommendations**

We understand the project streets will be paved with concrete. Pavements are designed based on the number of equivalent single axle loads (ESALs) anticipated over the design life. We understand a traffic impact analysis has estimated approximately 3,100 vehicles per day (vpd) will enter or leave the development. Based on this value, we have estimated project collector roads should be designed for about 2,200,000 ESALs over a 20-year design life. We understand local streets will have no more than 2,000 vpd, or about 1,400,000 ESALs over 20 years. These values assume that trucks will make up 3.2 percent or less of the design traffic. The Civil Engineer should evaluate whether this capacity is appropriate for the anticipated traffic.

Based on the anticipated traffic loading, we recommend the project roadways meet the minimum requirements provided in the Walker County Subdivision Regulations (2024). At the project site, we have estimated the minimum pavement sections can support approximately 1,400,000 ESALs over 20 years for local roads and about 3,900,000 for collector roads. Table 1 presents recommended pavement sections and reinforcement.

Walker County specifies a concrete compressive strength of 3,500 psi or more at 28 days. The concrete should be underlain by a chemically treated subgrade, as discussed below.

Concrete pavements should have longitudinal and transverse joints in accordance with Walker County standards. The pavement should also include crack control, construction, and/or expansion joints in accordance with Walker County standards and as deemed appropriate by the Civil Engineer.

#### **Subgrade Preparation Recommendations**

Prior to subgrade treatment, the roadway subgrade should be proofrolled. Any soft or weak areas observed during the proofrolling process should be removed and replaced with general fill compacted to 95 percent of maximum dry density.

Following proofrolling, the exposed surface of the pavement subgrade soils should be scarified to a depth of 6 or 8 inches (based on the depth of treatment specified in Table 1) and chemically treated. We recommend treatment procedures extend 2 feet or more beyond the edge of the pavement.

Lime treatment should be used in areas where cohesive soils are exposed, while lime-fly ash treatment should be used in areas where cohesionless/granular soils (or cohesive soils with a plasticity index of 15 or less) are exposed. We recommend that the decision regarding use of lime-fly ash in lieu of lime be made during construction based on the materials exposed at finished subgrade.

Lime treatment for cohesive soils should be done in accordance with TxDOT Standard Specifications, Item 260. The soils should be mixed with a sufficient quantity of hydrated lime to reduce the pH to a value of about 12.4 (or lime fixation). The soil and lime should be blended for the lime treatment to be effective. For estimating purposes, we recommend about 7 to 9 percent lime by dry soil weight be assumed at this site.

Lime-fly ash treatment should be performed in accordance with TxDOT Standard Specifications, Item 265. For estimating purposes, we recommend 3 percent hydrated lime and 7 percent fly ash (by dry unit weight).

The above recommendations are for design estimates only. We recommend the actual rate of application for the subgrade chemical (lime and lime-fly ash) treatment be determined by laboratory testing during construction.

We hope this provides you with the information you require at this time. We appreciate the opportunity to be of service to you during this phase of the project.

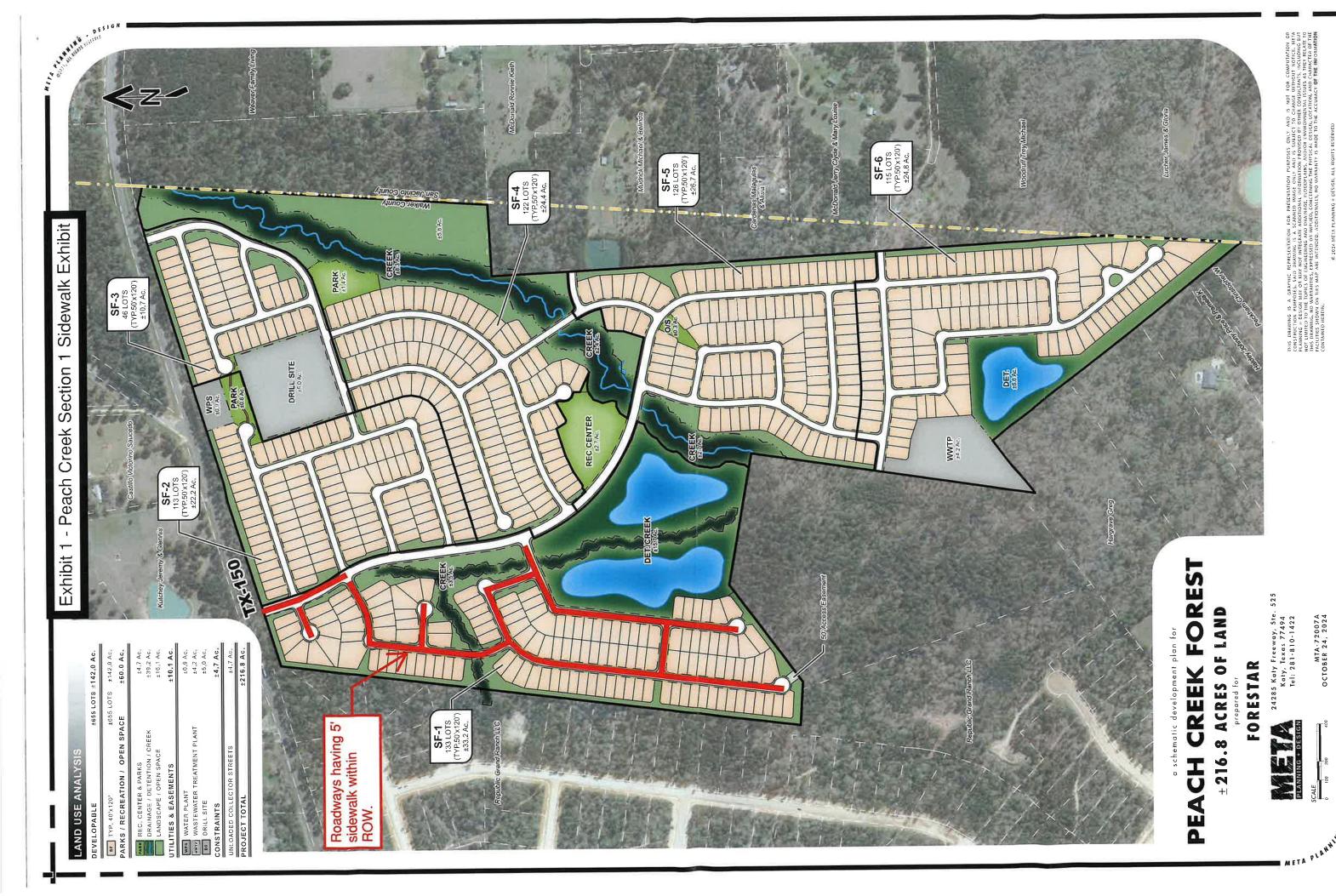

Alternative Permanent Erosion Controls and Exemptions of Roadside Ditches - Variance Request Response

### Response to item D.1 in the Variance Request Form:

A Variance is requested to Section B12.8.m, B12.8n, B12.9d, B12.10d to allow Flexamat as an alternative to both rip rap and slope paving, and B12.10, to allow all of the different swale types shown in this variance within the entire development (instead of only roadside ditch specs) of the Subdivision Regulations of Walker County, Texas as follows:

### Variance (Adding Flexamat as Alternative permanent erosion control to Section B12.8.m. B12.8n, B12.9d, B12.10d)

The Owner proposes submitting an alternative permanent erosion protection of Flexamat to all requirements per County Standards referencing slope paving and rock rip rap, but not energy dispator blocks when velocities exceed 10 fps. Flexamat has proven to perform at least as well as concrete slope paving, but it also can allow for grass to grow between the blocks allowing for a much more aesthetically pleasing and natural look and provides some energy dissipation as well.

Detention Facilities 12.8.m.

Flexamat would be allowed for Outlet Velocities exceeding 5 fps into Ponds and out of Ponds, but below 10 fps.

Detention Facilities 12.8n

Flexamat would be allowed for Emergency Overflow Weirs.

Roadway Bridges/Culverts 12.9d

Flexamat would be allowed for Outlet Velocities exceeding 5 fps at Culverts, but below 10 fps.

Roadside Ditches 12.10d

Flexamat would be allowed for ditches exceeding 3 fps for ditches and below.

## Variance (B12.10 Roadside Ditches with Additional Definitions.

The Owner proposes additional definitions of swales and ditches that do not fully comply with the subdivision regulations B12.10 for Roadside Ditches.

Perimeter Swales should follow all rules and regulations except the following

  - B12.10 e Side Slopes would have a maximum grade of 4:1.

#### Response to item E.2 in the Variance Request Form:

- Flexamat is a permanent erosion control measure that is much more visually appealing as it allows for grass growth between the blocks, provides for more energy dissipation than slope paving, is easier to install than slope paving, is easier to fix if failures occur, and can even outperform slope paving to slopes up to 3:1.
- Roadside Ditches are currently the only type of swale considered within Subdivision Regulations but is not inclusive of the required drainage swales required for development within Peach Creek.
   They are also overly restrictive due to required side slopes and design depth reflecting freeboard requirements despite still conveying the 100 year.

Attached are the documents pertaining to Flexamat Plus that are proposed within Peach Creek residential development. The purpose of this submission is to give an understanding of construction details, specifications of performance, final appearance, and feedback prior to submitting for a variance.

Items included have been explained below.

- 1. Flexamat Plus Oulet Armoring
  - a. This will be used at locations adjacent to slope paving to avoid concrete edge washout.
- 2. Flexamat Plus Overflow Channel Parallel to Flow
  - a. This will be used at locations parallel to Extreme Event Flow to avoid washout in extreme events.
- 3. Flexamat Plus Overflow Channel Perpendicular to Flow
  - a. This will be used at locations perpendicular to Extreme Event Flow to avoid washout in extreme events as well as channelized offsite flow.
- 4. Flexamat Plus Slope Armoring
  - a. This will be used to protect 4:1 Side Slopes when bends and curves are within ditch or downstream of overflow channel into detention pond or creek.
- 5. Flexamat Plus Specification
  - a. This will be used with the bidding documents for the contractor to be aware of the construction specifications.

Flexamat would be used in lieu of Subdivision Regulations with the same spirit of the regulations. Documented in the following are locations that would not be followed by using Flexamat

- 1. Detention Facilities 12.8.m
  - a. Rock Riprap/ Concrete Energy Dissipating Devices
- 2. Detention Facilities 12.8n
  - a. 5" Slope Paving for Emergency Overflow Weird
- 3. Roadway Bridges/Culverts 12.9d
  - a. Rock Riprap/ Concrete Lining/Energy Dissipating Devices
- 4. Roadside Ditches 12.10d
  - a. Rock Riprap/ Concrete Lining

Attached is an example of scour that Flexamat Plus was used to protect. Grass will grow between the blocks and create a blended look for residents, easier maintenance effort, while providing improved hydraulic performance.

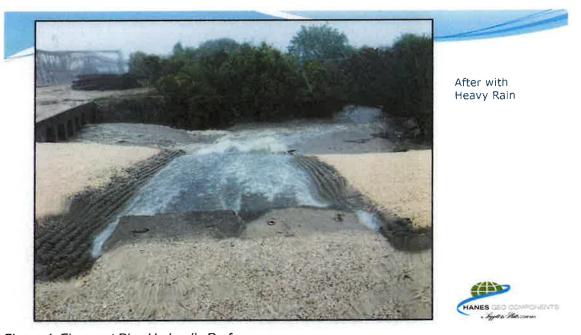
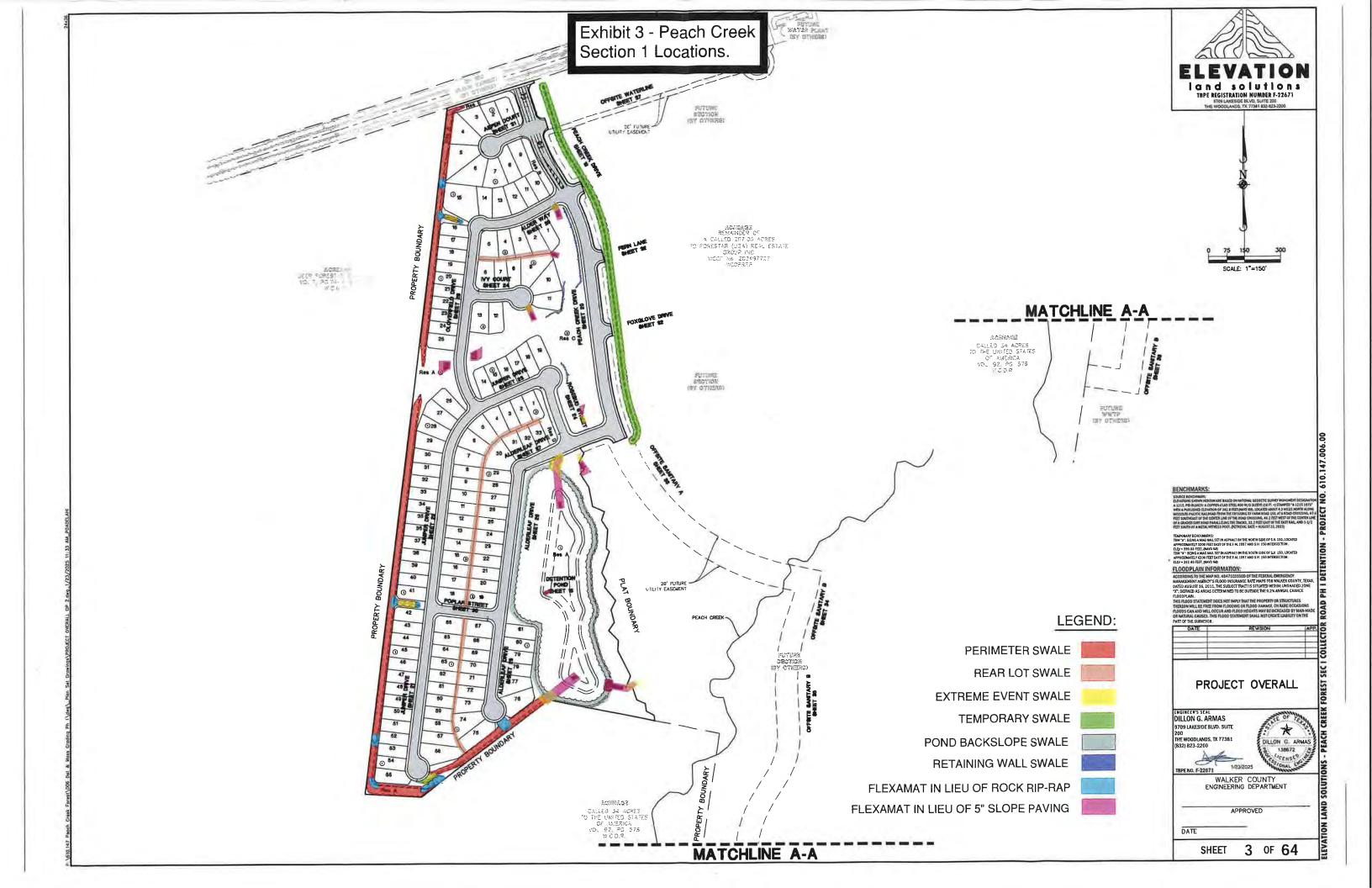


Figure 4: Flexamat Plus Hydraulic Performance

## **Flexamat Plus Specification**

#### 1. DESCRIPTION

A Tied Concrete Block Mat with Triple Layered Underlayment. This work shall consist of furnishing and placing the system in accordance with this specification and conforming with the lines, grades, design, and dimensions shown on the plans.

#### 2. MATERIALS

Flexamat Plus is manufactured from individual concrete blocks tied together with high strength knitted polypropylene bi-axial geogrid. Each block is tapered, beveled and interlocked and includes connections that prevent lateral displacement of the blocks within the mats when they are lifted for placement.

Tied Concrete Block Mats with Triple Underlayment shall be Flexamat Plus, manufactured by Motz Enterprises, Inc.

2.1. Blocks. Furnish blocks manufactured with concrete conforming to the cement requirements of ASTM C150 and to the aggregate requirements of ASTM C33. Blocks shall have a minimum weight of 3 lb. per block and placed no further than 2 in. apart. Material weight per square foot shall not exceed 10 lbs. Blocks shall have a 2.25" profile, a flat-top pyramid shape, and a coarse finish without protrusions. Concrete shall have a minimum compressive strength requirement of Table1 and certified by a third party.

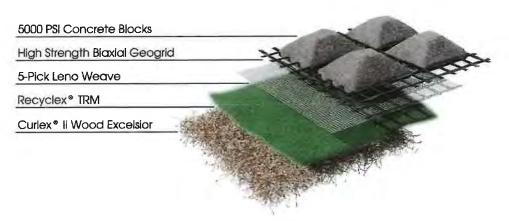

2.2. **Polypropylene Bi-Axial Geogrid.** The interlocking geogrid shall be an open knitted fabric composed of high tenacity, multifilament polypropylene yarns knitted and coated in tension with an acrylic based coating which is designed to resist degradation in environments with exposure to water and low pH (,4 pH) and high pH (>9 pH). When combined with the revetment mat, this will yield a high tenacity, low elongating, and continuous filament polypropylene geogrid that is embedded within the base of the concrete blocks. Ensure the geogrid meets the requirements of Table 2.

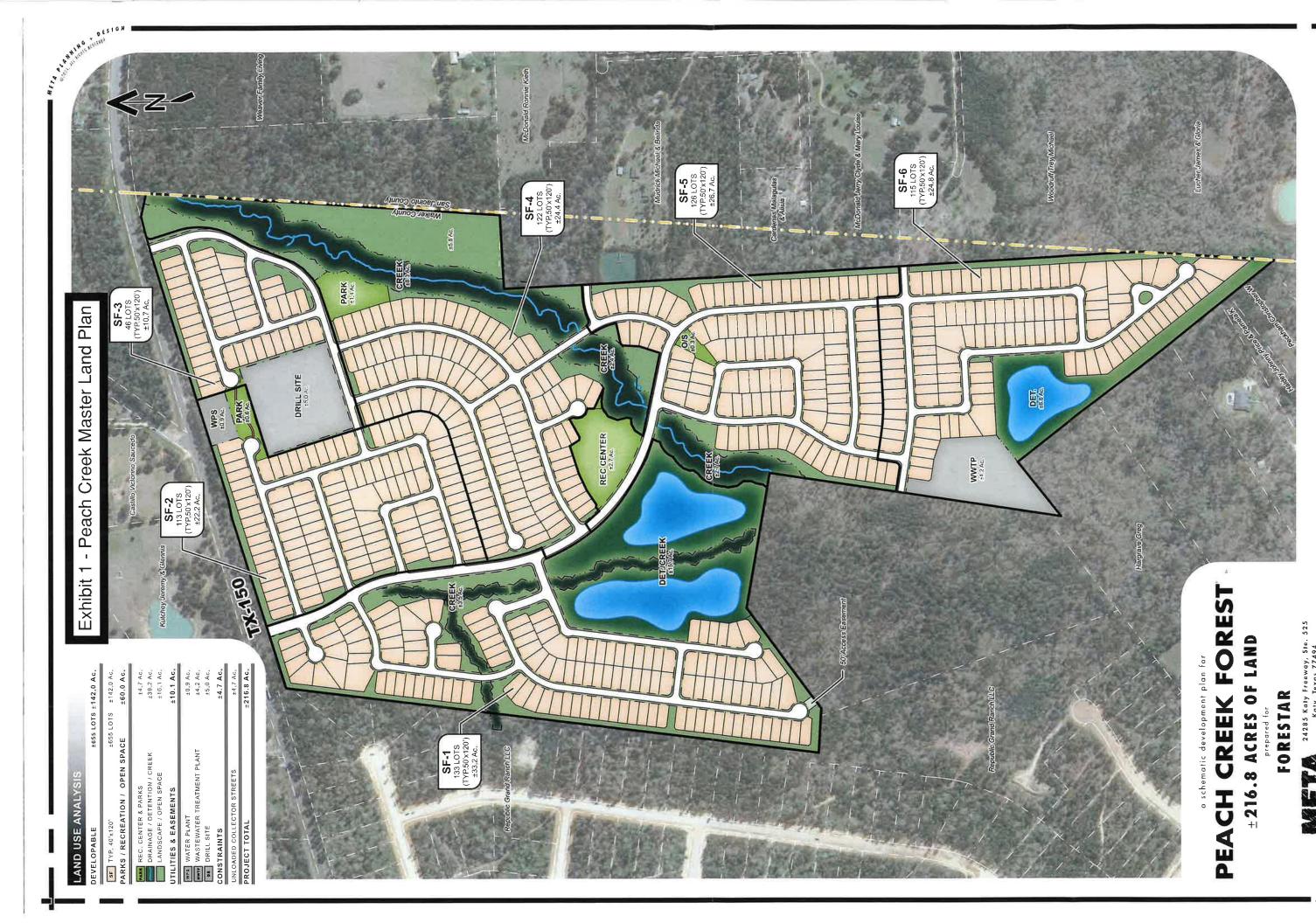

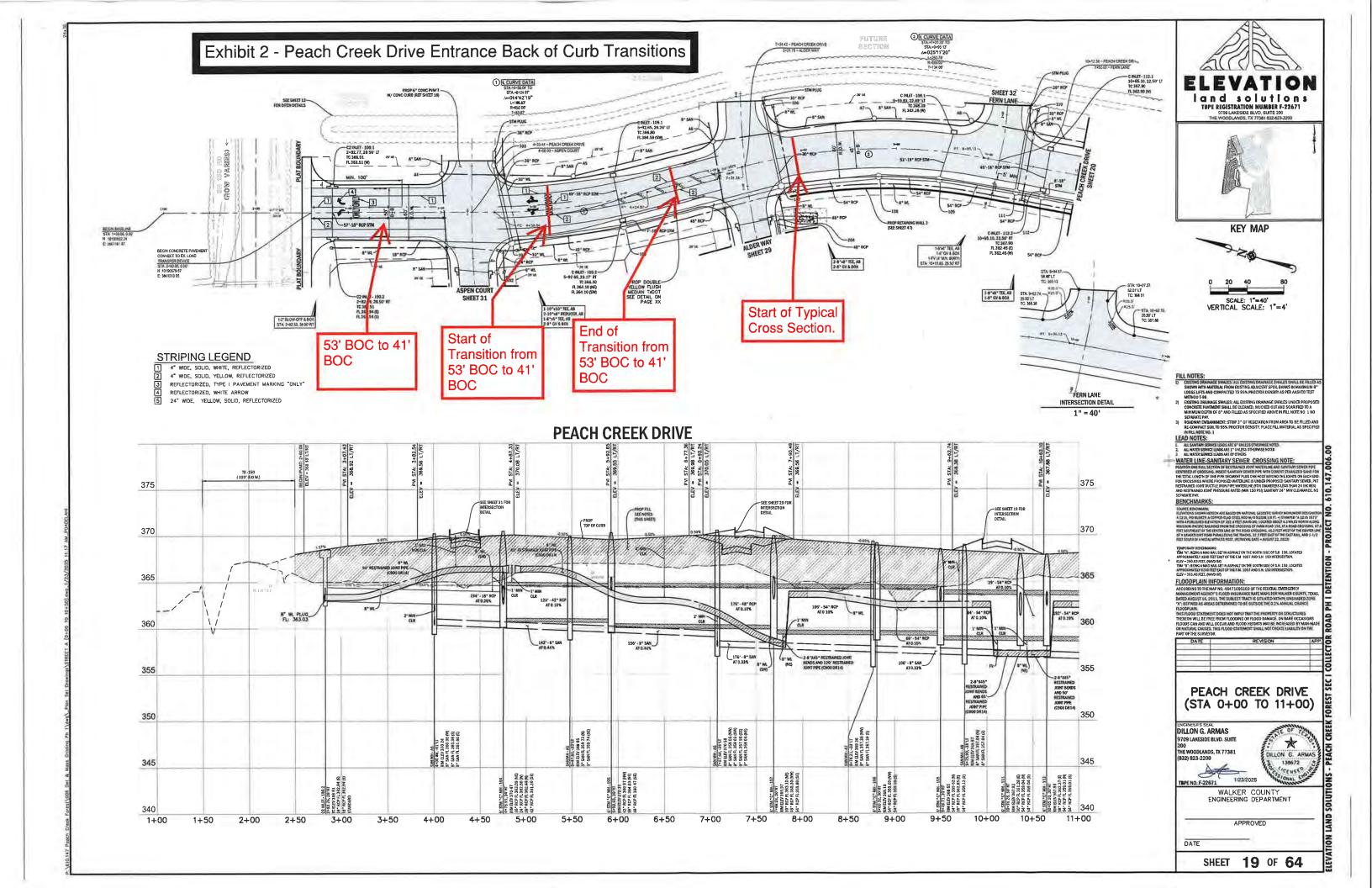

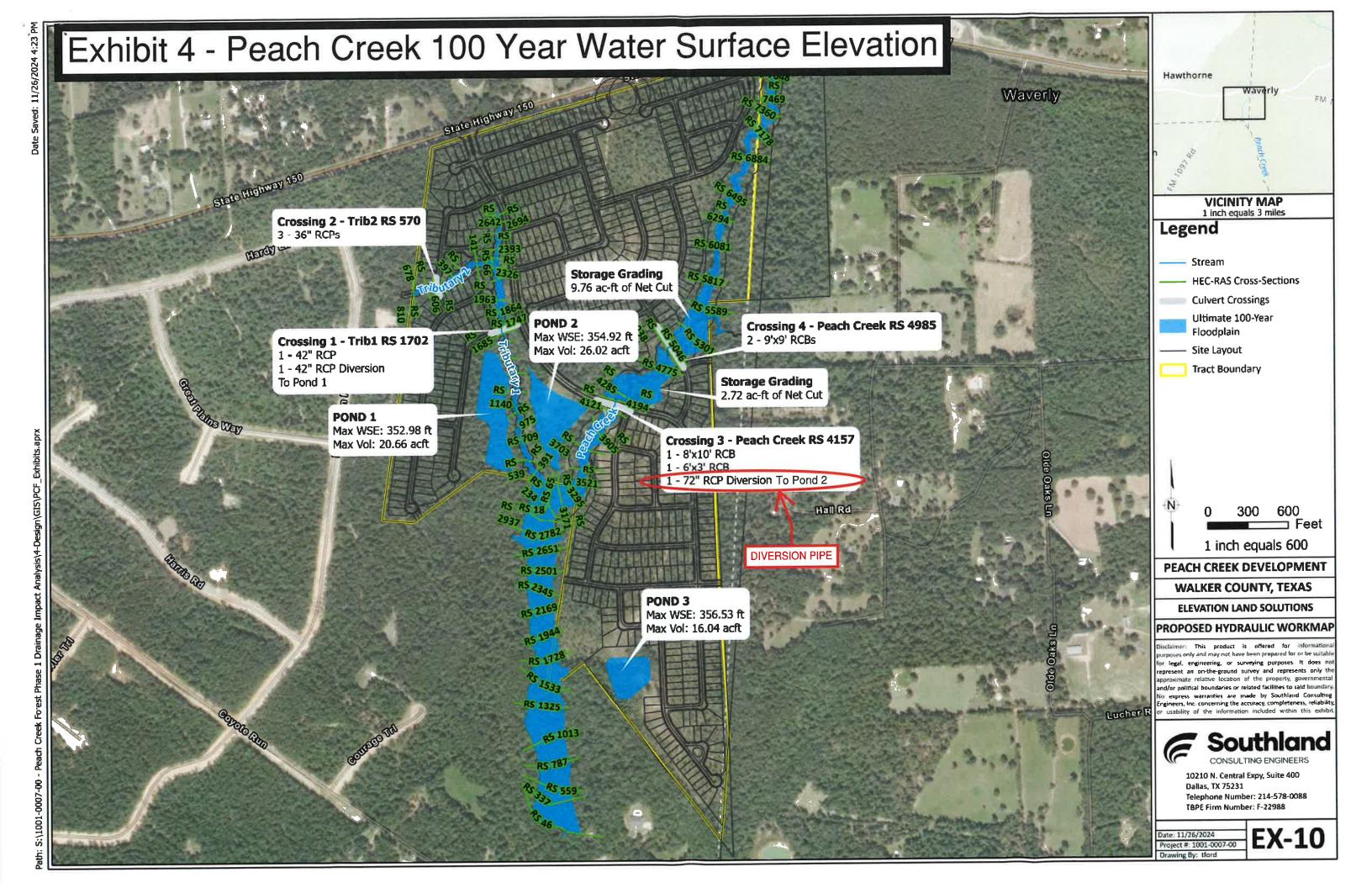

#### CONSTRUCTION PLAN VARIANCES

Pursuant to Section 7 – Maintenance of Walker County Subdivision Regulations, the following variances are requested in regards to (7.4).

- Field Inspection Comment No. 1 The existing detention outfall swale's cross-section (B-B) does not meet the minimum cross-section requirements.
   Response to Comment- Commissioner Brandon Decker has acknowledged this comment and has agreed that the existing channel is sufficient and the clearing of and regrading of the channel will do more harm than good. Jesse put your engineer's opinion and justification for the variance Please note that the channel's capacity was brought up during the plan review, and the Engineer indicated that, based on the existing topography, the swale had sufficient capacity.
- Field Inspection Comment No. 2 The cross-section of Ditch-6 does not meet the minimum cross-section requirement.
   Response to Comment This has been addressed, but not reinspected by Blyel's inspector. The ditch meets the minimum depth and 3 to 1 side slope ratio. This request is to not have to have this reinspected by Blyel's inspector.
- 3. Field Inspection Comment No. 3 The location of Ditch-6 may not meet the plan location, which means it would not intercept sufficient flow.
  Response to Comment This swale as shifted to the southwest due to an existing fence being in the center of the proposed easement, which was centered on the propose property line. The center of the constructed swale is on the southwest line of the previously proposed easement. We have shifted the easement to the southwest to fully encompass the constructed swale. Jesse put your engineer's opinion and justification for the variance... The shift in the swales location is minimal and will have a minimal affect on the overall flow that it is intended to intercept.
